## **Fiscal Analysis**

HB 1935, as introduced, upon review by fiscal staff and with consultation with the Council on Law Enforcement, Education, and Training (CLEET) is determined to have an impact on both local law enforcement and CLEET. According to CLEET:

The Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services Crisis Intervention Team program is a 40 hour program, and would need to be integrated into the Basic Academy. This would extend the length of the academy by one week, resulting in an additional charge of \$120 to each cadet's agency for the CLEET registration fee to cover meals. In addition to the increased registration fee paid by the employing agencies, utility costs would be expected to increase due to extending the use of the barracks. Utility estimates for the barracks only total approximately \$1,650 per week and we normally hold 5 academies annually for a total anticipated utility increase of only \$8,250. The greater cost will likely be in manpower. CLEET will need to coordinate statewide training with the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services to facilitate the training of currently certified law enforcement officers across the state. This could take up to one-half the time of an existing employee for at least the first year. Ongoing continuing education classes provided by the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services should not impact CLEET or CLEET staff aside from recording training and an increased number of suspensions due to an inability of officers to meet this new training requirement.
