NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 14 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-6-101 of Title 27A, unless 15 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 16 This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Healthy Soil 17 Program Act". 18 A new section of law to be codified SECTION 2. NEW LAW 19 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-6-102 of Title 27A, unless 20 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 21 As used in the Healthy Soil Program Act: 22 1. "Champion" means a land manager who is declared a soil 23 health champion due to the land manager's excellence in applying and 24 promoting soil health principles, as modeled by the Soil Health

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Champions Network of the National Association of Conservation
 Districts;

3 2. "Commission" means the Oklahoma Conservation Commission;
4 3. "Eligible entity" means a local governmental entity with
5 proven land management capacity to support healthy soil and
6 including conservation districts;

7 4. "Healthy soil" means soil that enhances its continuing
8 capacity to function as a biological system, increases its organic
9 matter, and improves its structure and water- and nutrient-holding
10 capacity;

11 5. "Program" means the healthy soil program created in this 12 act;

13 6. "Soil health principle" means a principle that promotes soil14 health in a given environment and includes:

15	a.	keeping	soil	covered,

- b. minimizing soil disturbance on cropland and minimizing
 external inputs,
- 18 c. maximizing biodiversity,
- 19 d. maintaining a living root, or
- e. integrating animals into land management, including
 grazing animals, birds, beneficial insects, or
 keystone species, such as earthworms;
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7. "Supported method" means a method that is based upon soil
 health principles and is scientifically supported to promote healthy
 soil;

8. "Technical assistance" means assistance provided to a farmer
or rancher to achieve the purpose of the Healthy Soil Program Act
and includes outreach, education, financial assistance or assistance
with project planning, project design, grant applications, project
implementation or project reporting; and

9. 9 "Technical assistance provider" means a local, state, federal, tribal, or educational entity with demonstrated technical 10 expertise in designing and implementing agricultural management 11 12 practices that contribute to healthy soils and includes a 13 conservation district, the United States Natural Resources 14 Conservation Service, the United States Forest Service, the United 15 States Bureau of Land Management, or the state Forestry Division. A new section of law to be codified 16 SECTION 3. NEW LAW 17 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-6-103 of Title 27A, unless 18 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. There is hereby created a healthy soil program to beadministered by the Oklahoma Conservation Commission.

B. The purpose of the program is to promote and support farming and ranching systems and other forms of land management that increase soil organic matter, aggregate stability, microbiology and

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1 water retention to improve the health, yield, and profitability of 2 the soils of the state.

SECTION 4. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 3 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-6-104 of Title 27A, unless 4 5 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: The healthy soil program shall be composed of: 6 Α. 7 A healthy soil assessment and education program; 1. 2. A healthy soil grant program; and 8 9 3. Other programs established by the Oklahoma Conservation Commission to accomplish the purposes of the Healthy Soil Program 10 11 Act. In administering the healthy soil assessment and education 12 в. 13 program, the Commission shall: 14 1. Work through technical assistance providers or eligible 15 entities to: 16 encourage farmers, ranchers, and land managers to a. 17 undertake voluntary soil health measurements, 18 raise awareness about desirable soil health b. 19 characteristics, 20 facilitate on-site, producer-led workshops and с. 21 training sessions to promote and engender soil health 22 stewardship, and 23 complete a baseline soil health assessment by testing d. 24 the organic matter, water infiltration rate,

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1 microbiology, and aggregate stability of soils, in 2 addition to analyzing phospholipids and monitoring 3 soil cover;

4 2. Establish a statewide network of champions to promote soil
5 health stewardship, offer guidance to producers and land managers,
6 and encourage teamwork;

7 3. Create a program to provide ongoing training in soil health
8 stewardship and workshop facilitation for champions and eligible
9 entities;

In collaboration with technical assistance providers,
 sponsor soil health workshops and training sessions through
 conservation districts on farms throughout the state; and

13 5. Educate students and the general public about the importance14 of soil health stewardship.

15 C. In administering the healthy soil grant program, the 16 Commission shall:

Award grants to eligible entities to provide technical
 assistance to producers and land managers in advancing soil health
 principles and implementing supported methods;

Develop a user-friendly grant program application and
 application and reporting processes;

3. Develop criteria for the award of grants; provided that
grants shall be awarded equitably and priority may be given to
eligible entities serving young producers, veterans, small farms or

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ranches or for projects that benefit economically or socially
 disadvantaged communities; and

3 4. Ensure that grant funds are only used to advance soil health4 and soil health stewardship.

D. The Commission shall encourage producer, land manager,
landowner, and interagency collaboration in the management of
healthy soils and shall:

8 1. Work with technical assistance providers to advance soil 9 health stewardship across private, state, federal, and tribal land 10 jurisdictions by fostering collaboration among producers, land 11 managers, and landowners; and

12 2. Conduct outreach to producers and land managers to promote 13 the program and other federal, state, or local grant opportunities 14 that support and promote healthy soils.

15 E. In administering the program, the Commission shall support16 local economic growth in Oklahoma and shall:

Identify ways to increase the generation and use of compost
 to build healthy soils;

To the extent permitted by statute, prioritize in-state
 sourcing of the resources needed for the program, including testing
 resources, compost, seeds, fencing supplies, and equipment; and

3. Support the emerging market for food grown in Oklahoma undermanagement for healthy soils.

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F. The Commission may adopt rules to carry out the provisions
 of the Heathy Soil Program Act.

SECTION 5. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 3 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-6-105 of Title 27A, unless 4 5 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 6 Funds appropriated to the Oklahoma Conservation Commission to 7 administer the healthy soil program may be used for: 1. The healthy soil grant program; 8 9 2. The healthy soil assessment and education program; 10 3. Promotion and outreach; 4. 11 Department staffing support; 12 Capacity building for eligible entities; 5. 13 6. Soil health research; 14 7. Travel reimbursement and per diem in accordance with the 15 State Travel Reimbursement Act, Section 500.1 et seq. of Title 74 of 16 the Oklahoma Statutes; and 17 8. Other expenditures as determined by the Commission to be 18 necessary to support the overall effective administration of the 19 program. 20 SECTION 6. This act shall become effective November 1, 2022. 21 22 23 24
