14 membership; requiring initial appointments by certain

2 rejections; prohibiting delegation of certain
3 responsibilities to a school district; providing for
4 powers and duties of charter school and virtual
5 charter school sponsors; requiring Statewide Charter

8 contracts beginning on certain date; providing
9 exemption from certain statutes and rules for charter
10 schools and virtual charter schools; requiring
11 charter contract to describe educational program
12 being offered; subjecting charter schools and virtual
13 charter schools to certain limitations on spending;
14 prescribing requirements for governing board members;
15 subjecting governing board to certain conflict of
16 interest requirements; requiring governing board to
17 comply with certain instruction and continuing
18 education requirements; requiring notification to
19 sponsor of certain significant actions; requiring
20 charter contracts to include certain performance
21 provisions; authorizing sponsor to develop a separate
22 performance framework; requiring submission of data
23 in certain identical format; prescribing minimum
24 framework for performance evaluation; including
certain indicators of evaluation; requiring annual
evaluation of performance framework; mandating
presentation of evaluation results in certain open
meeting; limiting provisions of charter contracts;
permitting an applicant to hold multiple charter
contracts; defining term; prohibiting certain schools

9 prohibiting certain students from participating in
10 certain activities; permitting participation in
11 intramural activities; designating certain students
12 as transfer students; prescribing process for
13 enrollment in virtual charter school; requiring
14 transmission of student records within certain time;
15 directing certain notification if technology
16 infrastructure is inadequate; prescribing limitation
17 of student transfers; defining term; prohibiting
18 additional transfer without certain concurrence;
19 providing a grace period for withdrawal; requiring
20 certain notification; providing for transfer for
21 students who have a parent or guardian in the
22 military; prescribing process for transfer; defining
23 terms; prohibiting the Statewide Charter School Board
24 from charging a fee for administrative or other
services; specifying how sponsor fee should be used;
directing development of certain data codes for
reporting expenditures; requiring sponsor to publish
certain report on its website; mandating sponsor to
present report in public meeting; providing content
for report; updating statutory language; transferring
oversight authority of the Charter School Closure
Reimbursement Revolving Fund; reassigning duty to
submit certain annual report; modifying authority over
the Charter Schools Incentive Fund; amending 70 O.S.
2021, Sections 3-145.5, 3-145.7, and 3-145.8, which
relate to virtual charter schools; deleting outdated
language; granting Statewide Virtual Charter School
Board authority over certain revolving fund until
certain date; transferring funds to certain revolving
fund on certain date; updating statutory references to
Statewide Charter School Board; requiring sponsor
governing board to designate representative to
complete annual sponsor workshop requirement;
including specified topics in workshop; amending 70
O.S. 2021, Section 5-200, which relates to management
organizations; requiring amounts paid to certain
organizations be pursuant to contract terms;

1 mandating disclosure pursuant to certain guidelines;
2 updating statutory citations; amending 70 O.S. 2021,
3 Section 18-124, which relates to limitations on
4 administrative services expenditures; providing
5 applicability of limitation to certain schools;
6 clarifying calculation for specified schools;
7 modifying definition; amending 70 O.S. 2021, Section
8 1210.704, which relates to the provision of advanced
9 placement courses; updating references to the
10 Statewide Charter School Board; repealing 70 O.S.
11 2021, Sections 3-135, 3-145.1, 3-145.2, 3-145.3, and
12 3-145.4, which relate to sponsor contract guidelines
13 and meetings and rule promulgation of the Statewide
14 Virtual Charter School Board; providing for
15 codification; providing effective dates; and
16 declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-132.1 of Title 70, unless
there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. There is hereby created the Statewide Charter School Board.
Beginning July 1, 2023, the Board shall have the sole authority to
sponsor statewide virtual charter schools in this state and may
sponsor charter schools in this state. The Board shall be composed
of nine (9) voting members as follows:

1. Three members appointed by the Governor, one of whom shall
initially be a person appointed by the Governor and currently
serving as a member of the Statewide Virtual Charter School Board

1 and one of whom shall possess strong experience and expertise in
2 virtual charter schools;

3 2. Two members appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the
4 Senate, one of whom shall initially be a person appointed by the
5 President Pro Tempore and currently serving as a member of the
6 Statewide Virtual Charter School Board;

7 3. Two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of
8 Representatives, one of whom shall initially be a person appointed
9 by the Speaker and currently serving as a member of the Statewide
10 Virtual Charter School Board;

11 4. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction or his or her
12 designee; and

13 5. The State Auditor and Inspector or his or her designee.

14 B. Initial appointments shall be made by August 31, 2022. The
15 President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of
16 Representatives shall each appoint one member for one (1) year and
17 one member for two (2) years. The Governor shall appoint one member
18 for one (1) year and two members for two (2) years. Members shall
19 serve until their successors are duly appointed for a term of three
20 (3) years. Appointments shall be made by and take effect on July 31
21 of the year in which the appointment is made. Annually by December
22 30 the Board shall elect from its membership a chair and vice-chair.
23 Members appointed to the Statewide Charter School Board shall
24 collectively possess strong experience and expertise in public and

1 nonprofit governance, management and finance, assessment, curriculum
2 and instruction, public charter schools, and public education law.
3 All appointed members of the Statewide Charter School Board shall
4 have demonstrated an understanding of and a commitment to charter
5 schools as a strategy for strengthening public education.

6 C. A member may be removed from the Board by the appointing
7 authority for cause which shall include, but not be limited to:

8 1. Being found guilty by a court of competent jurisdiction of a
9 felony or any offense involving moral turpitude;

10 2. Being found guilty of malfeasance, misfeasance, or
11 nonfeasance in relation to Board duties;

12 3. Being found mentally incompetent by a court of competent
13 jurisdiction; or

14 4. Failing to attend three successive meetings of the Board
15 without just cause, as determined by the Board.

16 D. Vacancies shall be filled by the appointing authority.

17 E. No member of the Senate or House of Representatives may be
18 appointed to the Board while serving as a member of the Legislature.

19 F. Members of the Statewide Charter School Board shall not
20 receive compensation but shall be reimbursed for necessary travel
21 expenses pursuant to the provisions of the State Travel
22 Reimbursement Act.

1 G. The Statewide Charter School Board shall meet at the call of
2 the chair. The first meeting of the Board shall be held no later
3 than sixty (60) days after the effective date of this act.

4 H. Five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum, and an
5 affirmative vote of at least five members shall be required for the
6 Board to take any final action.

7 I. Beginning July 1, 2023, statewide virtual charter schools
8 shall be sponsored only by the Statewide Charter School Board
9 created pursuant to this section. Effective July 1, 2023, the
10 Statewide Virtual Charter School Board shall be abolished and the
11 Statewide Charter School Board shall succeed to any contractual
12 rights and responsibilities and settlement agreements incurred by
13 the Statewide Virtual Charter School Board in a virtual charter
14 school sponsorship contract executed prior to July 1, 2023.

15 1. All powers, duties, responsibilities, policies, personnel,
16 property, equipment, supplies, records, assets, funds, current and
17 future liabilities, encumbrances, obligations, and indebtedness of
18 the Statewide Virtual Charter School Board or associated with a
19 virtual charter school sponsorship contract entered into by the
20 Statewide Virtual Charter School Board prior to July 1, 2023, shall
21 be transferred to the Statewide Charter School Board. No items
22 shall be expended or used for any purpose other than the performance
23 of duties and responsibilities as directed and required in this act.
24 Appropriate conveyances and other documents shall be executed to

1 effectuate the transfer of property associated with a sponsorship
2 contract. The Statewide Charter School Board may contract for
3 additional legal and administrative services as necessary to
4 effectuate the transfers provided in this subsection.

5 2. The Director of the Office of Management and Enterprise
6 Services shall coordinate the transfer of funds, allotments,
7 purchase orders, and outstanding financial obligations and
8 encumbrances relating to the regulation of virtual charter schools
9 as transferred pursuant to the provisions of this act.

10 3. Upon succession of sponsorship contracts, the Statewide
11 Charter School Board shall assume sponsorship of the virtual charter
12 schools for the remainder of the term of the contracts. Prior to
13 the end of the current term of the contract, the Statewide Charter
14 School Board shall allow a virtual charter school to apply for
15 renewal of the sponsorship contract in accordance with the renewal
16 procedures established pursuant to Section 3-137 of Title 70 of the
17 Oklahoma Statutes.

18 4. Effective July 1, 2023, all administrative rules promulgated
19 by the Statewide Virtual Charter School Board relating to the
20 implementation and enforcement of the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act
21 shall be enforceable by the Statewide Charter School Board. The
22 rules shall continue in force and effect and the Executive Director
23 of the Statewide Charter School Board shall have authority to amend,
24

1 repeal, recodify, or make additions to the rules pursuant to the
2 Administrative Procedures Act.

3 J. Effective July 1, 2023, the Statewide Charter School Board
4 shall succeed to any contractual rights and responsibilities and
5 settlement agreements incurred by the State Board of Education in a
6 charter school sponsorship contract executed prior to July 1, 2023.
7 All property, equipment, supplies, records, assets, funds, current
8 and future liabilities, encumbrances, obligations, and indebtedness
9 associated with a charter school sponsorship contract entered into
10 by the State Board of Education prior to July 1, 2023, shall be
11 transferred to the Statewide Charter School Board. Appropriate
12 conveyances and other documents shall be executed to effectuate the
13 transfer of property associated with a sponsorship contract. Upon
14 succession of sponsorship contracts, the Statewide Charter School
15 Board shall assume sponsorship of the charter schools for the
16 remainder of the term of the contracts. Prior to the end of the
17 current term of the contract, the Statewide Charter School Board
18 shall allow a charter school to apply for renewal of the sponsorship
19 contract in accordance with the renewal procedures established
20 pursuant to Section 3-137 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

21 K. Beginning July 1, 2023, at the end of the current term of a
22 charter school sponsorship contract with a school district, an
23 accredited comprehensive or regional institution that is a member of
24 The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, a community college,

1 or a federally recognized Indian tribe, a charter school may apply
2 for contract renewal with the Statewide Charter School Board for
3 sponsorship.

4 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
5 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-132.2 of Title 70, unless
6 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

7 A. Beginning July 1, 2023, and subject to the requirements of
8 the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act, the Statewide Charter School Board
9 shall:

10 1. Provide supervision and oversight of the operations of
11 statewide virtual charter schools in this state and charter schools
12 for which the Statewide Charter School Board is the sponsor,
13 recommend legislation pertaining to charter schools to the
14 Legislature, and promulgate rules and policies that the Board deems
15 necessary to accomplish the purposes prescribed in this section;

16 2. Ensure compliance with state laws and training requirements
17 for all charter schools, virtual charter schools, and sponsors;

18 3. Establish a procedure for accepting, approving, and
19 disapproving charter school and statewide virtual charter school
20 applications and a process for renewal or revocation of approved
21 charter contracts which meet the procedures set forth in the
22 Oklahoma Charter Schools Act;

23 4. Hire an executive director and other staff for its
24 operation;

1 5. Prepare a budget for expenditures necessary for the proper
2 maintenance of the Board and accomplishment of its purpose;

3 6. Comply with the requirements of the Oklahoma Open Meeting
4 Act and Oklahoma Open Records Act; and

5 7. Give priority to opening charter schools and virtual charter
6 schools that serve at-risk student populations or students from low-
7 performing traditional public schools.

8 B. The State Board of Education shall be responsible for
9 accreditation of charter schools and virtual charter schools and
10 ensure compliance with special education laws and federal laws and
11 programs administered by the State Board of Education.

12 C. 1. For purposes of the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act,
13 "charter school" means:

14 a. prior to July 1, 2023, a public school established by
15 contract with a school district board of education, a
16 technology center school district, a higher education
17 institution, a federally recognized Indian tribe, or
18 the State Board of Education, and

19 b. on July 1, 2023, and after, a public school
20 established by contract with a school district board
21 of education, a higher education institution, a
22 federally recognized Indian tribe, or the Statewide
23 Charter School Board,
24

1 to provide learning that will improve student achievement and as
2 defined in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, 20
3 U.S.C. 8065.

4 2. A charter school may consist of a new school site, new
5 school sites, or all or any portion of an existing school site. An
6 entire school district may not become a charter school site.

7 D. 1. For the purposes of the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act,
8 "conversion school" means a school created by converting all or any
9 part of a traditional public school in order to access any or all
10 flexibilities afforded to a charter school; provided, however, all
11 or any part of a traditional public school may not be converted to a
12 virtual charter school.

13 2. Prior to the board of education of a school district
14 converting all or any part of a traditional public school to a
15 conversion school, the board shall prepare a conversion plan. The
16 conversion plan shall include documentation that demonstrates and
17 complies with paragraphs 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17,
18 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 34, and 35 of subsection B of Section 3-134
19 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes. The conversion plan and all
20 documents shall be in writing and shall be available to the public
21 pursuant to the requirements of the Oklahoma Open Records Act. All
22 votes by the board of education of a school district to approve a
23 conversion plan shall be held in an open public session. If the
24 board of education of a school district votes to approve a

1 conversion plan, the board shall notify the State Board of Education
2 within sixty (60) days after the vote. The notification shall
3 include a copy of the minutes for the board meeting at which the
4 conversion plan was approved.

5 3. A conversion school shall comply with all the same
6 accountability measures as are required of a charter school as
7 defined in subsection B of this section. The provisions of Sections
8 3-140 and 3-142 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes shall not apply
9 to a conversion school. Conversion schools shall comply with the
10 same laws and State Board of Education rules relating to student
11 enrollment which apply to traditional public schools. Conversion
12 schools shall be funded by the board of education of the school
13 district as a school site within the school district and funding
14 shall not be affected by the conversion of the school.

15 4. The board of education of a school district may vote to
16 revert a conversion school back to a traditional public school at
17 any time; provided, the change shall only occur during a break
18 between school years.

19 5. Unless otherwise provided for in this subsection, a
20 conversion school shall retain the characteristics of a traditional
21 public school.

22 E. 1. Beginning July 1, 2023, the Statewide Charter School
23 Board shall make publicly available a list of supplemental online
24 courses which have been reviewed and certified by the Board to

1 ensure that the courses are high quality options and are aligned
2 with the subject matter standards adopted by the State Board of
3 Education pursuant to Section 11-103.6 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma
4 Statutes. The Statewide Charter School Board shall give special
5 emphasis on listing supplemental online courses in science,
6 technology, engineering, and math (STEM), foreign language, and
7 advanced placement courses. School districts shall not be limited
8 to selecting supplemental online courses that have been reviewed and
9 certified by the Statewide Charter School Board and listed as
10 provided for in this paragraph.

11 2. In conjunction with the Office of Management and Enterprise
12 Services, the Board shall negotiate and enter into contracts with
13 supplemental online course providers to offer a state rate price to
14 school districts for supplemental online courses that have been
15 reviewed and certified by the Statewide Charter School Board and
16 listed as provided for in this subsection.

17 SECTION 3. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
18 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-132.3 of Title 70, unless
19 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

20 There is hereby created in the State Treasury a revolving fund
21 for the Statewide Charter School Board to be designated the
22 "Statewide Charter School Board Revolving Fund". The fund shall be
23 a continuing fund, not subject to fiscal year limitations, and shall
24 consist of all monies received by the Statewide Charter School Board

1 from state appropriations. All monies accruing to the credit of the
2 fund are hereby appropriated and may be budgeted and expended by the
3 Statewide Charter School Board for the purposes set forth in Section
4 2 of this act. Expenditures from the fund shall be made upon
5 warrants issued by the State Treasurer against claims filed as
6 prescribed by law with the Director of the Office of Management and
7 Enterprise Services for approval and payment.

8 SECTION 4. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 3-104, is
9 amended to read as follows:

10 Section 3-104. A. The supervision of the public school system
11 of Oklahoma shall be vested in the State Board of Education and,
12 subject to limitations otherwise provided by law, the State Board of
13 Education shall:

14 1. Adopt policies and make rules for the operation of the
15 public school system of the state;

16 2. Appoint, prescribe the duties, and fix the compensation of a
17 secretary, an attorney, and all other personnel necessary for the
18 proper performance of the functions of the State Board of Education.
19 The secretary shall not be a member of the Board;

20 3. Submit to the Governor a departmental budget based upon
21 major functions of the Department as prepared by the State
22 Superintendent of Public Instruction and supported by detailed data
23 on needs and proposed operations as partially determined by the
24 budgetary needs of local school districts filed with the State Board

1 of Education for the ensuing fiscal year. Appropriations therefor
2 shall be made in lump-sum form for each major item in the budget as
3 follows:

- 4 a. State Aid to schools,
- 5 b. the supervision of all other functions of general and
6 special education including general control, free
7 textbooks, school lunch, Indian education, and all
8 other functions of the Board and an amount sufficient
9 to adequately staff and administer these services, and
10 c. the Board shall determine the details by which the
11 budget and the appropriations are administered.
12 Annually, the Board shall make preparations to
13 consolidate all of the functions of the Department in
14 such a way that the budget can be based on two items,
15 administration and aid to schools. A maximum amount
16 for administration shall be designated as a part of
17 the total appropriation;

18 4. On the first day of December preceding each regular session
19 of the Legislature, prepare and deliver to the Governor and the
20 Legislature a report for the year ending June 30 immediately
21 preceding the regular session of the Legislature. The report shall
22 contain:

- 23 a. detailed statistics and other information concerning
24 enrollment, attendance, expenditures including State

1 Aid, and other pertinent data for all public schools
2 in this state,

3 b. reports from each and every division within the State
4 Department of Education as submitted by the ~~State~~
5 Superintendent of Public Instruction and any other
6 division, department, institution, or other agency
7 under the supervision of the Board,

8 c. recommendations for the improvement of the public
9 school system of the state,

10 d. a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the
11 State Board of Education for the past year, and

12 e. a statement of plans and recommendations for the
13 management and improvement of public schools and such
14 other information relating to the educational
15 interests of the state as may be deemed necessary and
16 desirable;

17 5. Provide for the formulation and adoption of curricula,
18 courses of study, and other instructional aids necessary for the
19 adequate instruction of pupils in the public schools;

20 6. Have authority in matters pertaining to the licensure and
21 certification of persons for instructional, supervisory, and
22 administrative positions and services in the public schools of the
23 state subject to the provisions of Section 6-184 of this title, and
24 shall formulate rules governing the issuance and revocation of

1 certificates for superintendents of schools, principals,
2 supervisors, librarians, clerical employees, school nurses, school
3 bus drivers, visiting teachers, classroom teachers, and for other
4 personnel performing instructional, administrative, and supervisory
5 services, but not including members of boards of education and other
6 employees who do not work directly with pupils, and may charge and
7 collect reasonable fees for the issuance of such certificates:

8 a. the State Department of Education shall not issue a
9 certificate to and shall revoke the certificate of any
10 person who has been convicted, whether upon a verdict
11 or plea of guilty or upon a plea of nolo contendere,

11 Department of Education necessary to administer the
12 program, for consultative services, publication costs,
13 actual and necessary travel expenses as provided in
14 the State Travel Reimbursement Act incurred by persons

19 balance in the Teachers' Certificate Fund in excess of

23 Until July 1, 1997, the State Board of Education shall
24 have authority for approval of teacher education

1 programs. The State Board of Education shall also
2 have authority for the administration of teacher
3 residency and professional development, subject to the
4 provisions of the Oklahoma Teacher Preparation Act;

5 7. Promulgate rules governing the classification, inspection,
6 supervision, and accrediting of all public nursery, kindergarten,
7 elementary and secondary schools, and on-site educational services

5 money, buildings, gifts, donation, or other things of value which
6 may be offered or bequeathed to the schools under the supervision or
7 control of ~~said~~ the Board;

8 13. Have authority to require persons having administrative
9 control of all school districts in Oklahoma to make such regular and
10 special reports regarding the activities of the schools in ~~said~~ the
11 districts as the Board may deem needful for the proper exercise of
12 its duties and functions. Such authority shall include the right of
13 the State Board of Education to withhold all state funds under its

7 thereto, those duties not specifically mentioned herein if not
8 delegated by law to any other agency or official;

9 21. Administer the State Public Common School Building
10 Equalization Fund established by Section 32 of Article X of the

12 designated by the Legislature, other than ad valorem taxes, any
13 other funds identified by the State Department of Education, which
14 may include, but not be limited to, grants-in-aid from the federal

19 B. Except as otherwise provided for in Section 3-137 of this
20 title, an applicant seeking to establish a virtual charter school
21 shall submit a written application to the Statewide Charter School
22 Board, and an applicant seeking to establish a charter school shall
23 submit a written application to the proposed sponsor as prescribed
24 in subsection E of this section. The application shall include:

21 students who are academically behind;

22 17. A description of cocurricular or extracurricular programs

4 virtual charter school including those for special education
5 students;
- 6 20. An organizational chart that clearly presents the

8 school including lines of authority and reporting between the
9 governing board, staff, any related bodies such as advisory bodies
10 or parent and teacher councils, and any external organizations that
11 will play a role in managing the school;
- 12 21. A clear description of the roles and responsibilities for
13 the governing board, the leadership and management team for the
14 charter school, or virtual charter school and any other entities
15 shown in the organizational chart;
- 16 22. The leadership and teacher employment policies for the
17 charter school or virtual charter school;
- 18 23. Proposed governing bylaws;
- 19 24. Explanations of any partnerships or contractual
20 partnerships central to the operations or mission of the charter

23 all other significant operational or ancillary services;

6 to a proposed sponsor which shall either accept or reject

1 K. Sponsors including the Statewide Charter School Board, shall
2 ~~be required to~~ develop and maintain chartering policies and
3 practices consistent with recognized principles and standards for

5 ~~of Education~~ sponsoring in all major areas of ~~authorizing~~ sponsoring
6 responsibility, including organizational capacity and
7 infrastructure, soliciting and evaluating charter school and virtual

11 L. Sponsors acting in their official capacity shall be immune
12 from civil and criminal liability with respect to all activities

1 A charter school or virtual charter school shall use the Oklahoma
2 Cost Accounting System to report financial transactions to the

4 charter school or virtual charter school shall be subject to the
5 limitations on spending, including provisions of the Oklahoma
6 Constitution, for any funds received from the state, either through

9 with all federal and state laws relating to the education of

4 that may include multiple charter sites to the extent approved by
5 the sponsor and consistent with applicable law. An applicant or the

9 Upon contracting with any teacher or other personnel, the

15 students without a contract executed in accordance with the

12 the school district shall include charter schools in all planning

13 to develop a corrective action plan and corresponding timeline to
14 remedy any weaknesses, concerns, violations, or deficiencies. If the
15 sponsor requires a corrective action plan, the charter school or
16 virtual charter school shall have forty-five (45) days to respond to
17 the performance report and submit any corrections or clarifications
18 for the report. If the charter school or virtual charter school
19 does not substantially complete the corrective action plan, the
20 sponsor may choose not to renew the charter contract pursuant to the
21 requirements of this section.

22 C. 1. Prior to the beginning of the ~~fifth~~ final year of
23 operation, the charter school or virtual charter school may apply
24 for renewal of the contract with the sponsor including the Statewide

1 Charter School Board. The renewal application guidance shall, at a
2 minimum, provide an opportunity for the charter school or virtual
3 charter school to:

- 4 a. present additional evidence, beyond the data contained
5 in the performance report, supporting its case for
6 charter renewal,

1 charter contract in accordance with the performance framework set
2 forth in the charter contract and shall take into consideration the
3 percentage of at-risk students enrolled in the school;

4 2. Grant renewal to charter schools or virtual charter schools
5 that have achieved the standards, targets, and performance
6 expectations as stated in the charter contract and are
7 organizationally and fiscally viable and have been faithful to the
8 terms of the contract and applicable law;

9 3. Ensure that data used in making renewal decisions are
10 available to the school and the public; and

11 4. Provide a public report summarizing the evidence used as the
12 basis for each decision.

13 E. If a sponsor denies a request for renewal, the governing
14 board of the sponsor may, if requested by the charter school,
15 proceed to binding arbitration as provided for in subsection G of
16 Section 3-134 of this title.

17 F. A sponsor may terminate a contract during the term of the
18 contract for failure to meet the requirements for student
19 performance contained in the contract and performance framework,
20 failure to meet the standards of fiscal management, violations of
21 the law, or other good cause. The sponsor shall give at least
22 ninety (90) days' written notice to the governing board of the
23 charter school or virtual charter school prior to terminating the
24 contract. The governing board may request, in writing, an informal

1 hearing before the sponsor within fourteen (14) days of receiving
2 notice. The sponsor shall conduct an informal hearing before taking
3 action. If a sponsor decides to terminate a contract, the governing

4 schools in the state. Each charter school and virtual charter

7 b. is on pace for on-time completion of the course as

18 b. the number of school days proportional to the
19 percentage of the course that has been completed, or

20 c. the number of school days proportional to the
21 percentage of the required minimum number of completed
22 instructional activities during the quarter.

23 C. For the purposes of this section, "instructional activities"
24 shall include instructional meetings with a teacher, completed

1 assignments that are used to record a grade for a student that is
2 factored into the student's grade for the semester during which the
3 assignment is completed, testing, and school-sanctioned field trips,
4 and orientation.

5 D. Each statewide virtual charter school approved and sponsored
6 by the ~~Statewide Virtual Charter School Board~~ pursuant to the
7 ~~provisions of Section 3-145.3 of this title~~ Statewide Charter School
8 Board shall offer a student orientation, notify the parent or legal
9 guardian and each student who enrolls in that school of the
10 requirement to participate in the student orientation, and require
11 all students enrolled to complete the student orientation prior to

14 rules to develop materials for orientation.

15 E. Any student that is behind pace and does not complete an
16 instructional activity for a fifteen-school-day period shall be
17 withdrawn for truancy. The virtual charter school shall submit a
18 notification to the parent or legal guardian of a student who has
19 been withdrawn for truancy or is approaching truancy.

20 F. A student who is reported for truancy two times in the same
21 school year shall be withdrawn and prohibited from enrolling in the
22 same virtual charter school for the remainder of the school year.

23 G. The governing ~~body~~ board of each statewide virtual charter
24 school shall develop, adopt, and post on the school's website a

1 policy regarding consequences for a student's failure to attend
2 school and complete instructional activities. The policy shall
3 state, at a minimum, that if a student fails to consistently attend
4 school and complete instructional activities after receiving a
5 notification pursuant to subsection E of this section and reasonable
6 intervention strategies have been implemented, a student shall be
7 subject to certain consequences including withdrawal from the school
8 for truancy.

9 H. If a statewide virtual charter school withdraws a student

19 SECTION 17. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
20 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-145.9 of Title 70, unless
21 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

22 Beginning with the 2023-2024 school year, members of a charter
23 school sponsor governing board shall designate a representative from
24 the board to complete an annual sponsor workshop requirement

1 provided by the Statewide Charter School Board for a minimum of two
2 (2) hours but not to exceed twelve (12) hours. The sponsor workshop
3 shall include, but not be limited to, information regarding the
4 Charter Schools Act, charter governance, Internal Revenue Services
5 rules for nonprofits, and school finance laws.

6 SECTION 18. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 5-200, is
7 amended to read as follows:

8 Section 5-200. A. As used in this section, "educational
9 management organization" means a for-profit or nonprofit
10 organization that receives public funds to provide administration
11 and management services for a charter school, statewide virtual
12 charter school or traditional public school.

13 B. A charter school that contracts with an educational
14 management organization shall use the Oklahoma Cost Accounting
15 System (OCAS) to report the total amount paid to an educational
16 management organization pursuant to the terms of the contract as
17 well as actual itemized expenditure information for the goods or
18 services provided by the management organization as defined by OCAS
19 expenditure codes, including the total compensation package of the
20 superintendent including the base salary, insurance, retirement and
21 other fringe benefits.

22 C. ~~Any~~ Pursuant to Internal Revenue Service guidelines, any
23 owner of an educational management organization shall be required to
24 disclose to the governing board of the school in a public meeting

1 any ownership position in any business that contracts or proposes to
2 contract with the same public school that the educational management
3 organization is managing.

4 D. Whenever any person shall enter into a contract with any
5 school district or public charter school in the state to teach in
6 such school district or public charter school the contract shall be
7 binding on the teacher and on the board of education until the
8 teacher legally has been discharged from the teaching position or
9 released by the board of education from the contract. Except as
10 provided in Section 5-106A of ~~Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes~~ this
11 title, until such teacher has been thus discharged or released, the
12 teacher shall not have authority to enter into a contract with any
13 other board of education in Oklahoma for the same time covered by
14 the original contract. If upon written complaint by the board of
15 education in a district any teacher is reported to have failed to
16 obey the terms of the contract previously made and to have entered
17 into a contract with another board of education, including a public
18 charter school board of education, without having been released from
19 the former contract except as provided in Section 5-106A of ~~Title 70~~
20 ~~of the Oklahoma Statutes~~ this title, the teacher, upon being found
21 to be employed full-time for another public school, including a
22 public charter school in the state, at a hearing held before the
23 State Board of Education, shall have such teacher's certificate

1 suspended for the remainder of the term for which the contract was

3 SECTION 19. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 18-124, is
4 amended to read as follows:

5 Section 18-124. A. Any school district with an average daily
6 attendance (ADA) of more than one thousand five hundred (1,500)
7 students for the preceding year which expends for administrative
8 services in the 2005-06 school year or any school year thereafter,
9 less expenditures for legal services, more than five percent (5%) of
10 the amount it expends for total expenditures, less expenditures for
11 legal services, shall have the amount which exceeds the five percent
12 (5%) withheld the following year from the Foundation and Salary
13 Incentive Aid for the school district.

14 B. Any school district with an average daily attendance (ADA)
15 of more than five hundred (500) students but not more than one
16 thousand five hundred (1,500) students for the preceding year which
17 expends for administrative services in the 2005-06 school year or
18 any school year thereafter, less expenditures for legal services,
19 more than seven percent (7%) of the amount it expends for total
20 expenditures, less expenditures for legal services, shall have the
21 amount which exceeds the seven percent (7%) withheld the following
22 year from the Foundation and Salary Incentive Aid for the school
23 district.

1 C. Any school district with an average daily attendance (ADA)
2 of five hundred (500) or fewer students for the preceding year which
3 expends for administrative services in the 2005-06 school year or
4 any school year thereafter, less expenditures for legal services,
5 more than eight percent (8%) of the amount it expends for total
6 expenditures, less expenditures for legal services, shall have the
7 amount which exceeds the eight percent (8%) withheld the following
8 year from the Foundation and Salary Incentive Aid for the school
9 district.

10 D. The provisions of this section shall apply to charter
11 schools and virtual charter schools which contract with an
12 educational management organization as defined in Section 5-200 of
13 this title. The expenditure limits shall not exceed the percentages
14 prescribed in subsections A, B, and C of this section, and the
15 calculation of administrative services for schools which contract
16 with an educational management organization shall be the combined
17 amount of administrative services expended by the school and the
18 educational management organization.

19 E. For purposes of this section, "administrative services"
20 means costs associated with:

- 21 1. Staff for the board of education;
- 22 2. The secretary/clerk for the board of education;
- 23 3. Staff relations;
- 24 4. Negotiations staff;

1 5. Immediate staff of the superintendent, any elementary
2 superintendent or any assistant superintendent;

3 6. Any superintendent, elementary superintendent, or assistant
4 superintendent;

5 7. Any employee of a school district employed as a director,
6 coordinator, supervisor, or who has responsibility for
7 administrative functions of a school district; ~~and~~

8 8. Any consultant hired by the school district; and

9 9. Administrative services paid to an educational management
10 organization as defined in Section 5-200 of this title.

11 ~~E.~~ F. If an employee of a school district is employed in a
12 position where part of the employee's time is spent as an
13 administrator and part of the time is spent in nonadministrative
14 functions, the percentage of time spent as an administrator shall be
15 included as administrative services. A superintendent who spends
16 part of the time performing exempted nonadministrative services such
17 as teaching in the classroom, serving as a principal, counselor, or
18 library media specialist, can code up to forty percent (40%) of
19 their salary to other nonadministrative functions. The total amount
20 of time a superintendent of a school district spends performing
21 services for a school district shall be included as administrative
22 services even if part of the time the superintendent is performing
23 nonexempted nonadministrative service functions. The total amount
24 received by a superintendent from the school district as salary, for

1 the performance of administrative and nonexempted nonadministrative
2 services, shall be recorded under the code for superintendent salary
3 as provided for in the Oklahoma Cost Accounting System.

4 ~~F.~~ G. Each school site within a school district shall take
5 steps to ensure that the administrative costs for the school comply
6 with the expenditure limits established for school districts in this
7 section.

8 ~~G.~~ H. Funds withheld pursuant to the provisions of this section
9 shall be distributed through the State Aid formula to the districts
10 not so penalized.

11 ~~H.~~ I. For the 2003-04 and 2004-05 school year, school districts
12 shall report to the State Department of Education the costs
13 associated with administrative services for the school district as
14 defined in subsection D of this section.

15 SECTION 20. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 1210.704,
16 is amended to read as follows:

17 Section 1210.704 A. Beginning with the 2024-2025 school year,
18 all public high schools in this state shall make a minimum of four
19 advanced placement courses available to students.

20 B. ~~Local~~ School district boards of education ~~in each district~~
21 shall be responsible for ensuring annually that all high school
22 students have access to advanced placement courses beginning in the
23 2024-2025 school year. Such access may be provided through
24 enrollment in courses offered through:

1 1. A school site or sites within the district;

2 2. A ~~career and technology institution~~ technology center school
3 within the district;

4 3. A An online learning program offered by the ~~Statewide~~
5 ~~Virtual Charter School Board~~ Statewide Charter School Board or one
6 of its vendors; or

7 4. A school site or sites in another school district.

8 C. The ~~Statewide Virtual Charter School Board~~ Statewide Charter
9 School Board shall maintain an online learning platform to provide
10 high quality online learning opportunities for Oklahoma students
11 that are aligned with the subject matter standards adopted by the
12 State Board of Education pursuant to Section 11-103.6 of ~~Title 70 of~~
13 ~~the Oklahoma Statutes~~ this title. The Board shall implement online
14 courses, with an emphasis on science, technology, engineering, and
15 math (STEM) courses, foreign language courses, and advanced
16 placement courses. The online platform shall be available to all
17 Oklahoma school districts.

18 D. The State Department of Education shall provide information
19 to all ~~local~~ boards of education, to be distributed to their
20 students and parents, on available opportunities and the enrollment
21 process for students to take advanced placement courses. The
22 information shall explain the value of advanced placement courses in
23 preparing students for postsecondary-level coursework, enabling
24

1 students to gain access to postsecondary opportunities, and
2 qualifying for scholarships and other financial aid opportunities.

3 E. The State Department of Education shall retain records of
4 which options outlined in subsection B of this section ~~local~~ boards
5 of education selected for their students and make the information
6 available on the Department's website.

7 F. As used in this section, "advanced placement course" shall
8 have the same meaning as provided in paragraph 1 of Section 1210.702
9 of ~~Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes~~ this title.

10 SECTION 21. REPEALER 70 O.S. 2021, Sections 3-135, 3-
11 145.1, 3-145.2, 3-145.3, and 3-145.4, are hereby repealed.

12 SECTION 22. Sections 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15,
13 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, and 21 of this act shall become effective July
14 1, 2023.

15 SECTION 23. Sections 1, 2, and 3 of this act shall become
16 effective July 1, 2022.

17 SECTION 24. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
18 of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
19 declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
20 be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
