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22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

 SECTION 1.
 AMENDATORY
 70 O.S. 2011, Section 18-200.1, as

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 amended by Section 1, Chapter 128, O.S.L. 2020 (70 O.S. Supp. 2020,

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 Section 18-200.1), is amended to read as follows:

4 Section 18-200.1 A. Beginning with the 1997-98 2022-2023 school year, and each school year thereafter, each school district 5 shall have its initial allocation of State Aid calculated based on 6 7 the state dedicated revenues actually collected during the preceding fiscal year, the adjusted assessed valuation of the preceding year 8 9 and the highest weighted average daily membership for the school 10 district of the two (2) preceding school years; however, the 11 weighted membership of nonresident, transferred pupils enrolled in 12 online courses shall be based on the weighted average daily 13 membership of the preceding school year. Each school district shall 14 submit the following data based on the first nine (9) weeks, to be 15 used in the calculation of the average daily membership of the 16 school district:

- 17 1. Student enrollment by grade level;
- 18 2. Pupil category counts; and
- 19 3. Transportation supplement data.

20 On or before December 30, the State Department of Education 21 shall determine each school district's current year allocation 22 pursuant to subsection D of this section. The State Department of 23 Education shall complete an audit, using procedures established by 24 the Department, of the student enrollment by grade level data, pupil category counts and transportation supplement data to be used in the
 State Aid Formula pursuant to subsection D of this section by
 December 1 and by January 15 shall notify each school district of
 the district's final State Aid allocation for the current school
 year. The January payment of State Aid and each subsequent payment

for the remainder of the school year shall be based on the final 7 State Aid allocation as calculated in subsection D of this section. 8 Except for reductions made due to the assessment of penalties by the 9 State Department of Education according to law, the January payment 10 of State Aid and each subsequent payment for the remainder of the 11 school year shall not decrease by an amount more than the amount 12 that the current chargeable revenue increases for that district.

13 The State Department of Education shall retain not less than Β. 14 one and one-half percent $(1 \ 1/2\%)$ of the total funds appropriated 15 for financial support of schools, to be used to make midyear 16 adjustments in State Aid and which shall be reflected in the final 17 allocations. If the amount of appropriated funds, including the one 18 and one-half percent $(1 \ 1/2\%)$ retained, remaining after January 1 of 19 each year is not sufficient to fully fund the final allocations, the 20 Department shall recalculate each school district's remaining 21 allocation pursuant to subsection D of this section using the 22 reduced amount of appropriated funds.

C. On and after July 1, 1997, the amount of State Aid each
district shall receive shall be the sum of the Foundation Aid, the

Salary Incentive Aid and the Transportation Supplement, as adjusted pursuant to the provisions of subsection G of this section and Section 18-112.2 of this title; provided, no district having per pupil revenue in excess of three hundred percent (300%) of the average per pupil revenue of all districts shall receive any State Aid or Supplement in State Aid.

7 The July calculation of per pupil revenue shall be determined by 8 dividing the district's second preceding year's total weighted 9 average daily membership (ADM) into the district's second preceding 10 year's total revenues excluding federal revenue, insurance loss 11 payments, reimbursements, recovery of overpayments and refunds, 12 unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, 13 and less the amount of any transfer fees paid in that year.

The December calculation of per pupil revenue shall be determined by dividing the district's preceding year's total weighted average daily membership (ADM) into the district's preceding year's total revenues excluding federal revenue, insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and less the amount of any transfer fees paid in that year.

D. For the 1997-98 school year, and each school year thereafter, Foundation Aid, the Transportation Supplement and Salary Incentive Aid shall be calculated as follows:

1 1. Foundation Aid shall be determined by subtracting the amount 2 of the Foundation Program Income from the cost of the Foundation 3 Program and adding to this difference the Transportation Supplement. 4 The Foundation Program shall be a district's highest a. 5 higher weighted average daily membership based on the first nine (9) weeks of the current school year, the 6 7 preceding school year or the second or the preceding school year of a school district, as determined by the 8 9 provisions of subsection A of Section 18-201.1 of this 10 title and paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4 of subsection B of 11 Section 18-201.1 of this title, multiplied by the Base 12 Foundation Support Level. However, for the portion of 13 weighted membership derived from nonresident, 14 transferred pupils enrolled in online courses, the 15 Foundation Program shall be a district's weighted 16 average daily membership of the preceding school year 17 or the first nine (9) weeks of the current school 18 year, whichever is greater, as determined by the 19 provisions of subsection A of Section 18-201.1 of this 20 title and paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4 of subsection B of 21 Section 18-201.1 of this title, multiplied by the Base 22 Foundation Support Level.

b. The Foundation Program Income shall be the sum of thefollowing:

1 (1)The adjusted assessed valuation of the current 2 school year of the school district, minus the 3 previous year protested ad valorem tax revenues 4 held as prescribed in Section 2884 of Title 68 of 5 the Oklahoma Statutes, multiplied by the mills 6 levied pursuant to subsection (c) of Section 9 of 7 Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution, if 8 applicable, as adjusted in subsection (c) of 9 Section 8A of Article X of the Oklahoma 10 Constitution. For purposes of this subsection, 11 the "adjusted assessed valuation of the current 12 school year" shall be the adjusted assessed 13 valuation on which tax revenues are collected 14 during the current school year, and 15 Seventy-five percent (75%) of the amount received (2) 16 by the school district from the proceeds of the 17 county levy during the preceding fiscal year, as 18 levied pursuant to subsection (b) of Section 9 of 19 Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution, and 20 (3) Motor Vehicle Collections, and 21 (4) Gross Production Tax, and 22 (5) State Apportionment, and 23 (6) R.E.A. Tax. 24

The items listed in divisions (3), (4), (5), and (6) of this subparagraph shall consist of the amounts actually collected from such sources during the preceding fiscal year calculated on a per capita basis on the unit provided for by law for the distribution of each such revenue.

7 2. The Transportation Supplement shall be equal to the average
8 daily haul times the per capita allowance times the appropriate
9 transportation factor.

a. The average daily haul shall be the number of children
in a district who are legally transported and who live
one and one-half (1 1/2) miles or more from school.
b. The per capita allowance shall be determined using the
following chart:

- 2 Multiply the Incentive Aid guarantee by the district's a. 3 highest higher weighted average daily membership based 4 on the first nine (9) weeks of the current school 5 year, the preceding school year or the second or the 6 preceding school year of a school district, as 7 determined by the provisions of subsection A of Section 18-201.1 of this title and paragraphs 1, 2, 3 8 9 and 4 of subsection B of Section 18-201.1 of this 10 title.
- 11 b. Divide the district's adjusted assessed valuation of 12 the current school year minus the previous year's 13 protested ad valorem tax revenues held as prescribed 14 in Section 2884 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes, 15 by one thousand (1,000) and subtract the quotient from 16 the product of subparagraph a of this paragraph. 1 E. By June 30, 1998, the State Department of Education shall 2 develop and the Department and all school districts shall have 3 implemented a student identification system which is consistent with 4 the provisions of subsections C and D of Section 3111 of Title 74 of 5 the Oklahoma Statutes. The student identification system shall be used specifically for the purpose of reporting enrollment data by 6 7 school sites and by school districts, the administration of the 8 Oklahoma School Testing Program Act, the collection of appropriate 9 and necessary data pursuant to the Oklahoma Educational Indicators 10 Program, determining student enrollment, establishing a student 11 mobility rate, allocation of the State Aid Formula and mid-year 12 adjustments in funding for student growth. This enrollment data 13 shall be submitted to the State Department of Education in 14 accordance with rules promulgated by the State Board of Education. 15 Funding for the development, implementation, personnel training and 16 maintenance of the student identification system shall be set out in 17 a separate line item in the allocation section of the appropriation 18 bill for the State Board of Education for each year.

F. 1. In the event that ad valorem taxes of a school district are determined to be uncollectible because of bankruptcy, clerical error, or a successful tax protest, and the amount of such taxes deemed uncollectible exceeds Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) or an amount greater than twenty-five percent (25%) of ad valorem taxes per tax year, or the valuation of a district is lowered by order of

1 the State Board of Equalization, the school district's State Aid, 2 for the school year that such ad valorem taxes are calculated in the 3 State Aid Formula, shall be determined by subtracting the net 4 assessed valuation of the property upon which taxes were deemed 5 uncollectible from the assessed valuation of the school district and 6 the state. Upon request of the local board of education, it shall 7 be the duty of the county assessor to certify to the Director of Finance of the State Department of Education the net assessed 8 9 valuation of the property upon which taxes were determined 10 uncollectible.

In the event that the amount of funds a school district 11 2. 12 receives for reimbursement from the Ad Valorem Reimbursement Fund is 13 less than the amount of funds claimed for reimbursement by the 14 school district due to insufficiency of funds as provided in Section 15 193 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes, then the school district's 16 assessed valuation for the school year that such ad valorem 17 reimbursement is calculated in the State Aid Formula shall be 18 adjusted accordingly.

19 G. 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 18-112.2 of 20 this title, a school district shall have its State Aid reduced by an 21 amount equal to the amount of carryover in the general fund of the 22 district as of June 30 of the preceding fiscal year, that is in 23 excess of the following standards for two (2) consecutive years: 24 Total Amount of Amount of

By February 1 the State Department of Education shall send 13 by certified mail, with return receipt requested, to each School 14 District Superintendent, Auditor and Regional Accreditation Officer 15 a notice of and calculation sheet reflecting the general fund 16 balance penalty to be assessed against that school district. 17 Calculation of the general fund balance penalty shall not include 18 federal revenue. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of this written 19 notice the school district shall submit to the Department a written 20 reply either accepting or protesting the penalty to be assessed 21 against the district. If protesting, the school district shall 22 submit with its reply the reasons for rejecting the calculations and 23 documentation supporting those reasons. The Department shall review 24 all school district penalty protest documentation and notify each

1 district by March 15 of its finding and the final penalty to be 2 assessed to each district. General fund balance penalties shall be 3 assessed to all school districts by April 1.

Any school district which receives proceeds from a tax
settlement or a Federal Emergency Management Agency settlement
during the last two (2) months of the preceding fiscal year shall be
exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if the
penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from the
tax settlement.

4. Any school district which receives an increase in State Aid because of a change in Foundation and/or Salary Incentive Aid factors during the last two (2) months of the preceding fiscal year shall be exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if the penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from the increase in State Aid.

16 5. If a school district does not receive Foundation and/or 17 Salary Incentive Aid during the preceding fiscal year, the State 18 Board of Education may waive the penalty assessed in this subsection 19 if the penalty would result in a loss of more than forty percent 20 (40%) of the remaining State Aid to be allocated to the school 21 district between April 1 and the remainder of the school year and if 22 the Board determines the penalty will cause the school district not 23 to meet remaining financial obligations.

6. Any school district which receives gross production revenue
 apportionment during the 2002-2003 school year or in any subsequent
 school year that is greater than the gross production revenue
 apportionment of the preceding school year shall be exempt from the
 penalty assessed in this subsection, if the penalty would occur
 solely as a result of the gross production revenue apportionment, as
 determined by the State Board of Education.

8 7. Beginning July 1, 2003, school districts that participate in 9 consolidation or annexation pursuant to the provisions of the 10 Oklahoma School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation Act shall be 11 exempt from the penalty assessed in this subsection for the school 12 year in which the consolidation or annexation occurs and for the 13 next three (3) fiscal years.

14 8. Any school district which receives proceeds from a sales tax 15 levied by a municipality pursuant to Section 22-159 of Title 11 of 16 the Oklahoma Statutes or proceeds from a sales tax levied by a 17 county pursuant to Section 1370 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes 18 during the 2003-2004 school year or the 2004-2005 school year shall 19 be exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if the 20 penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from the 21 sales tax levy.

9. Any school district which has an amount of carryover in the
general fund of the district in excess of the limits established in
paragraph 1 of this subsection during the fiscal year years

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beginning July 1, 2019 2022, and July 1, 2023, shall not be assessed
 a general fund balance penalty as provided for in this subsection.

3 10. For purposes of calculating the general fund balance 4 penalty, the terms "carryover" and "general fund balance" shall not 5 include federal revenue.

6 In order to provide startup funds for the implementation of Η. 7 early childhood programs, State Aid may be advanced to school districts that initially start early childhood instruction at a 8 9 school site. School districts that desire such advanced funding 10 shall make application to the State Department of Education no later 11 than September 15 of each year and advanced funding shall be awarded 12 to the approved districts no later than October 30. The advanced 13 funding shall not exceed the per pupil amount of State Aid as 14 calculated in subsection D of this section per anticipated Head 15 Start eligible student. 1 district for calculation of Foundation Aid purposes pursuant to paragraph 1 of subsection D of Section 18-200.1 of this title shall 2 3 be the sum of the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the 4 weighted pupil category calculation, the weighted district 5 calculation and the weighted teacher experience and degree 6 calculation. The weighted membership of a school district for 7 calculation of Salary Incentive Aid purposes pursuant to paragraph 3 8 of subsection D of Section 18-200.1 of this title shall be the sum 9 of the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil 10 category calculation, the weighted district calculation and the 11 weighted teacher experience and degree calculation.

The Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, the weighted 13 calculations provided for in subsection A of this section shall be 14 based on the highest higher weighted average daily membership of the 15 first nine (9) weeks of the current school year, the preceding 16 school year or the second or the preceding school year of a school 17 district, unless otherwise specified. The highest higher of the 18 three (3) two (2) weighted average daily memberships shall be used 19 consistently in all of the calculations; however, the weighted 20 calculation for a statewide virtual charter school experiencing a 21 significant decline in membership shall be based on the first nine 22 (9) weeks of the current school year and not on the preceding school 23 year or the second preceding school year for the statewide virtual 24 charter school. For purposes of this subsection, "significant

1 decline in membership" means equal to or greater than a fifteen 2 percent (15%) decrease in average daily membership from the preceding school year to the average daily membership of the first 3 nine (9) weeks of the current school year. The average daily 4 5 membership data used for all calculations in paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 6 4 of this subsection shall be the same as used in the calculation of 7 the State Aid Formula. 1 on any national standardized test of intellectual ability plus the 2 number of students identified as gifted pursuant to subparagraphs a 3 through d of paragraph 1 of Section 1210.301 of this title or (2) 4 the sum of the number of students who scored in the top three 5 percent (3%) on any national standardized test of intellectual ability plus eight percent (8%) of the total average daily 6 7 membership of the school district for the preceding school year. For the 1997-98 school year and subsequent school years, the number 8 9 to be multiplied by the weight assigned to the gifted category in 10 subparagraph g of this paragraph shall be the lesser of (1) the sum 11 of the number of students who scored in the top three percent (3%)12 on any national standardized test of intellectual ability plus the 13 number of students identified as gifted pursuant to subparagraphs a 14 through d of paragraph 1 of Section 1210.301 of this title, or (2) 15 the sum of the number of students who scored in the top three 16 percent (3%) on any national standardized test of intellectual 17 ability plus eight percent (8%) of the total average daily 18 membership of the school district for the first nine (9) weeks of 19 the school year.

3. The weighted district calculation shall be determined by determining the calculations for each school district for both the small school district formula and the district sparsity - isolation formula, applying whichever is the greater of the calculations of

the two formulas and then applying the restrictions pursuant to
 subparagraph c of this paragraph.

a. Small school district formula: 529 minus the average
daily membership divided by 529 times .2 times total
average daily membership.

The small school district formula calculation shall apply 6 7 only to school districts whose highest average daily membership is less than 529 pupils. School districts which 8 9 are consolidated or annexed after July 1, 2003, pursuant to 10 the Oklahoma School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation 11 Act shall have the weighted district size calculation for 12 the three (3) school years following the fiscal year in 13 which such consolidation occurred calculated to be the sum 14 of the individual consolidated districts computed as if the 15 consolidation had not taken place. Thereafter, any such 16 district which is consolidated pursuant to the Oklahoma 17 School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation Act shall not 18 qualify for the weighted district calculation unless the 19 district can satisfy the specifications herein. Subject to 20 the provisions of subparagraph c of this paragraph, the 21 resulting number shall be counted as additional students 22 for the purpose of calculating State Aid. 23 District sparsity - isolation formula: b.

The district sparsity - isolation formula calculation shall apply only to school districts:

- (1) whose total area in square miles is greater than the average number of square miles for all school districts in this state; and
- (2) whose areal density is less than one-fourth (1/4) of the state average areal density. Areal density shall be determined by dividing the school district's average daily membership by the school district's total area in square miles.

The district sparsity - isolation formula calculation shall be calculated as follows:

13The school district student cost factor multiplied by14the school district area factor. The resulting15product shall be multiplied by the school district's16average daily membership. Subject to the provisions17of subparagraph c of this paragraph, the resulting18number shall be counted as additional students for the19purpose of calculating State Aid.

20The school district student cost factor shall be calculated21as follows:

The school district's average daily membership shall be categorized into the following grade level groups

however, the district area cost factor shall not exceed one (1.0).

6 The State Board of Education shall define geographical barriers 7 whose location in a school district would inhibit the district from 8 consolidation or annexation. The Board shall make available an 9 application process, review applications, and for districts the 10 Board deems necessary allow additional square miles to be used for 11 the purposes of calculations used for the weighted district sparsity 12 - isolation formula. Provided, that the additional square miles 13 allowed for geographical barriers shall not exceed thirty percent 14 (30%) of the district's actual size.

15 c. State Aid funds which a district is calculated to
16 receive as a result of the weighted district
17 calculation shall be restricted as follows:

18If, after the weighted district calculation is19applied, the district's projected per pupil20revenue exceeds one hundred fifty percent (150%)21of the projected state average per pupil revenue,22then the district's State Aid shall be reduced by23an amount that will restrict the district's24projected per pupil revenue to one hundred fifty

percent (150%) of the projected state average per pupil revenue. Provided, in applying the restriction provided in this division, the district's State Aid shall not be reduced by an amount greater than by the amount of State Aid which was generated by the weighted district calculation.

The July calculation of the projected per pupil 8 9 revenue shall be determined by dividing the highest of 10 the district's preceding two (2) years year's average 11 daily membership (ADM) as weighted by the pupil grade 12 level, the pupil category, the district and the 13 teacher experience degree index calculations for 14 projected State Aid into the district's projected 15 total revenues including projected funds for the State 16 Aid Formula for the preceding year, net assessed 17 valuation for the preceding calendar year times 18 thirty-nine (39) mills, county revenues excluding the 19 county four-mills revenues for the second preceding 20 year, other state appropriations for the preceding 21 year and the collections for the preceding year of 22 state apportionment, motor vehicle revenue, gross 23 production tax and R.E.A. tax.

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1 The December calculation of the projected per pupil 2 revenue shall be determined by dividing the highest 3 higher of the district's first nine (9) weeks of the 4 current school year or the two (2) preceding school 5 years year's average daily membership (ADM) as weighted by the pupil grade level, the pupil category, 6 7 the district and the teacher experience degree index calculations for projected State Aid into the 8 9 district's projected total revenues including funds 10 for the December calculation of the current year State 11 Aid Formula, net assessed valuation for the current 12 calendar year times thirty-nine (39) mills, county 13 revenues excluding the county four-mills revenue for 14 the preceding year, other state appropriations for the 15 preceding year and the collections for the preceding 16 year of state apportionment, motor vehicle revenue, 17 gross production tax and R.E.A. tax. 18 The district's projected total revenues for each 19 calculation shall exclude the following collections 20 for the second preceding year: federal revenue, 21 insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of 22 overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior 23 expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and 24 other local miscellaneous revenues.

4. The weighted teacher experience and degree calculation shall
 be determined in accordance with the teacher experience and degree
 index. The State Department of Education shall determine an index
 for each state teacher by using data supplied in the school
 district's teacher personnel reports of the preceding year and
 utilizing the index as follows:

16 The school district teacher index for each school district shall 17 be determined by subtracting the weighted average state teacher from 18 the weighted average district teacher. Multiply the school district 19 teacher index if greater than zero by .7 and then multiply that 20 product by the sum of the district's weighted pupil grade level 21 calculation provided in paragraph 1 of this subsection and the 22 weighted pupil category calculation provided in subparagraph m of 23 paragraph 2 of this subsection to determine the weighted teacher 24 experience and degree calculation.
