15	carryover; prohibiting assessment of carryover penalty in certain fiscal years; adjusting weighted
16	calculations for weighted average daily membership;
17	revising July and December calculations for projected per pupil revenue; providing an effective date; and providing for conditional effect.

20	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
21	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 18-200.1, as
22	amended by Section 1, Chapter 128, O.S.L. 2020 (70 O.S. Supp. 2020,
23	Section 18-200.1), is amended to read as follows:

1 Section 18-200.1 A. Beginning with the <del>1997-98</del> 2022-2023 2 school year, and each school year thereafter, each school district shall have its initial allocation of State Aid calculated based on 3 the state dedicated revenues actually collected during the preceding 4 5 fiscal year, the adjusted assessed valuation of the preceding year and the highest weighted average daily membership for the school 6 7 district of the two (2) preceding school years; however, the weighted membership of nonresident, transferred pupils enrolled in 8 9 online courses shall be based on the weighted average daily 10 membership of the preceding school year. Each school district shall 11 submit the following data based on the first nine (9) weeks, to be 12 used in the calculation of the average daily membership of the school district: 13 Student enrollment by grade level; 1. 14 2. Pupil category counts; and 15 3. Transportation supplement data. 16 On or before December 30, the State Department of Education 17 shall determine each school district's current year allocation 18 pursuant to subsection D of this section. The State Department of 19 Education shall complete an audit, using procedures established by 20 the Department, of the student enrollment by grade level data, pupil 21 category counts and transportation supplement data to be used in the 22 State Aid Formula pursuant to subsection D of this section by 23

24 December 1 and by January 15 shall notify each school district of

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1 the district's final State Aid allocation for the current school 2 year. The January payment of State Aid and each subsequent payment 3 for the remainder of the school year shall be based on the final State Aid allocation as calculated in subsection D of this section. 4 5 Except for reductions made due to the assessment of penalties by the State Department of Education according to law, the January payment 6 7 of State Aid and each subsequent payment for the remainder of the school year shall not decrease by an amount more than the amount 8 9 that the current chargeable revenue increases for that district. 10 в. The State Department of Education shall retain not less than one and one-half percent  $(1 \ 1/2\%)$  of the total funds appropriated 11 12 for financial support of schools, to be used to make midyear adjustments in State Aid and which shall be reflected in the final 13 allocations. If the amount of appropriated funds, including the one 14 and one-half percent (1 1/2%) retained, remaining after January 1 of 15 each year is not sufficient to fully fund the final allocations, the 16 Department shall recalculate each school district's remaining 17 allocation pursuant to subsection D of this section using the 18

19 reduced amount of appropriated funds.

C. On and after July 1, 1997, the amount of State Aid each
district shall receive shall be the sum of the Foundation Aid, the
Salary Incentive Aid and the Transportation Supplement, as adjusted
pursuant to the provisions of subsection G of this section and
Section 18-112.2 of this title; provided, no district having per

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pupil revenue in excess of three hundred percent (300%) of the
 average per pupil revenue of all districts shall receive any State
 Aid or Supplement in State Aid.

The July calculation of per pupil revenue shall be determined by dividing the district's second preceding year's total weighted average daily membership (ADM) into the district's second preceding year's total revenues excluding federal revenue, insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and less the amount of any transfer fees paid in that year.

The December calculation of per pupil revenue shall be determined by dividing the district's preceding year's total weighted average daily membership (ADM) into the district's preceding year's total revenues excluding federal revenue, insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and less the amount of any transfer fees paid in that year.

D. For the 1997-98 school year, and each school year thereafter, Foundation Aid, the Transportation Supplement and Salary Incentive Aid shall be calculated as follows:

Foundation Aid shall be determined by subtracting the amount
 of the Foundation Program Income from the cost of the Foundation
 Program and adding to this difference the Transportation Supplement.

1 The Foundation Program shall be a district's highest a. 2 higher weighted average daily membership based on the 3 first nine (9) weeks of the current school year, the preceding school year or the second or the preceding 4 5 school year of a school district, as determined by the provisions of subsection A of Section 18-201.1 of this 6 title and paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4 of subsection B of 7 Section 18-201.1 of this title, multiplied by the Base 8 9 Foundation Support Level. However, for the portion of 10 weighted membership derived from nonresident, 11 transferred pupils enrolled in online courses, the 12 Foundation Program shall be a district's weighted average daily membership of the preceding school year 13 or the first nine (9) weeks of the current school 14 15 year, whichever is greater, as determined by the provisions of subsection A of Section 18-201.1 of this 16 title and paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4 of subsection B of 17 Section 18-201.1 of this title, multiplied by the Base 18 Foundation Support Level. 19

## 20 b. The Foundation Program Income shall be the sum of the21 following:

(1) The adjusted assessed valuation of the current
 school year of the school district, minus the
 previous year protested ad valorem tax revenues

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1 held as prescribed in Section 2884 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes, multiplied by the mills 2 levied pursuant to subsection (c) of Section 9 of 3 Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution, if 4 5 applicable, as adjusted in subsection (c) of Section 8A of Article X of the Oklahoma 6 7 Constitution. For purposes of this subsection, the "adjusted assessed valuation of the current 8 9 school year" shall be the adjusted assessed valuation on which tax revenues are collected 10 11 during the current school year, and 12 (2) Seventy-five percent (75%) of the amount received 13 by the school district from the proceeds of the county levy during the preceding fiscal year, as 14 levied pursuant to subsection (b) of Section 9 of 15 Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution, and 16 (3) Motor Vehicle Collections, and 17 Gross Production Tax, and 18 (4) State Apportionment, and 19 (5) (6) R.E.A. Tax. 20 The items listed in divisions (3), (4), (5), and (6)21 of this subparagraph shall consist of the amounts 22 actually collected from such sources during the 23 preceding fiscal year calculated on a per capita basis 24

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1 on the unit provided for by law for the distribution 2 of each such revenue. 3 2. The Transportation Supplement shall be equal to the average 4 daily haul times the per capita allowance times the appropriate 5 transportation factor. The average daily haul shall be the number of children 6 a. 7 in a district who are legally transported and who live one and one-half  $(1 \ 1/2)$  miles or more from school. 8 9 b. - 7 b. Divide the district's adjusted assessed valuation of the current school year minus the previous year's 8 9 protested ad valorem tax revenues held as prescribed 10 in Section 2884 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes, 11 by one thousand (1,000) and subtract the quotient from 12 the product of subparagraph a of this paragraph. The remainder shall not be less than zero (0). 13
- Multiply the number of mills levied for general fund 14 с. purposes above the fifteen (15) mills required to 15 support Foundation Aid pursuant to division (1) of 16 subparagraph b of paragraph 1 of this subsection, not 17 including the county four-mill levy, by the remainder 18 of subparagraph b of this paragraph. The product 19 shall be the Salary Incentive Aid of the district. 20 Ε. By June 30, 1998, the State Department of Education shall 21 develop and the Department and all school districts shall have 22 implemented a student identification system which is consistent with 23 the provisions of subsections C and D of Section 3111 of Title 74 of

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1 the Oklahoma Statutes. The student identification system shall be 2 used specifically for the purpose of reporting enrollment data by 3 school sites and by school districts, the administration of the Oklahoma School Testing Program Act, the collection of appropriate 4 5 and necessary data pursuant to the Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program, determining student enrollment, establishing a student 6 7 mobility rate, allocation of the State Aid Formula and mid-year adjustments in funding for student growth. This enrollment data 8 9 shall be submitted to the State Department of Education in 10 accordance with rules promulgated by the State Board of Education. 11 Funding for the development, implementation, personnel training and 12 maintenance of the student identification system shall be set out in a separate line item in the allocation section of the appropriation 13 bill for the State Board of Education for each year. 14

15 F. 1. In the event that ad valorem taxes of a school district are determined to be uncollectible because of bankruptcy, clerical 16 error, or a successful tax protest, and the amount of such taxes 17 deemed uncollectible exceeds Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) or 18 an amount greater than twenty-five percent (25%) of ad valorem taxes 19 20 per tax year, or the valuation of a district is lowered by order of the State Board of Equalization, the school district's State Aid, 21 for the school year that such ad valorem taxes are calculated in the 22 State Aid Formula, shall be determined by subtracting the net 23 24 assessed valuation of the property upon which taxes were deemed

uncollectible from the assessed valuation of the school district and
the state. Upon request of the local board of education, it shall
be the duty of the county assessor to certify to the Director of
Finance of the State Department of Education the net assessed
valuation of the property upon which taxes were determined
uncollectible.

2. In the event that the amount of funds a school district 7 receives for reimbursement from the Ad Valorem Reimbursement Fund is 8 9 less than the amount of funds claimed for reimbursement by the 10 school district due to insufficiency of funds as provided in Section 11 193 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes, then the school district's 12 assessed valuation for the school year that such ad valorem reimbursement is calculated in the State Aid Formula shall be 13 adjusted accordingly. 14

G. 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 18-112.2 of 15 this title, a school district shall have its State Aid reduced by an 16 amount equal to the amount of carryover in the general fund of the 17 district as of June 30 of the preceding fiscal year, that is in 18 excess of the following standards for two (2) consecutive years: 19 Total Amount of Amount of 20 General Fund Collections, General Fund 21 Excluding Previous Year Balance 22 Cash Surplus as of June 30 Allowable 23 Less than \$1,000,000 408 488 24

2. By February 1 the State Department of Education shall send 8 9 by certified mail, with return receipt requested, to each School 10 District Superintendent, Auditor and Regional Accreditation Officer a notice of and calculation sheet reflecting the general fund 11 12 balance penalty to be assessed against that school district. 13 Calculation of the general fund balance penalty shall not include federal revenue. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of this written 14 15 notice the school district shall submit to the Department a written reply either accepting or protesting the penalty to be assessed 16 against the district. If protesting, the school district shall 17 submit with its reply the reasons for rejecting the calculations and 18 documentation supporting those reasons. The Department shall review 19 all school district penalty protest documentation and notify each 20 district by March 15 of its finding and the final penalty to be 21 assessed to each district. General fund balance penalties shall be 22 assessed to all school districts by April 1. 23

3. Any school district which receives proceeds from a tax
 settlement or a Federal Emergency Management Agency settlement
 during the last two (2) months of the preceding fiscal year shall be
 exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if the
 penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from the
 tax settlement.

Any school district which receives an increase in State Aid
because of a change in Foundation and/or Salary Incentive Aid
factors during the last two (2) months of the preceding fiscal year
shall be exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if
the penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from
the increase in State Aid.

5. If a school district does not receive Foundation and/or 13 Salary Incentive Aid during the preceding fiscal year, the State 14 15 Board of Education may waive the penalty assessed in this subsection if the penalty would result in a loss of more than forty percent 16 (40%) of the remaining State Aid to be allocated to the school 17 district between April 1 and the remainder of the school year and if 18 the Board determines the penalty will cause the school district not 19 to meet remaining financial obligations. 20

6. Any school district which receives gross production revenue apportionment during the 2002-2003 school year or in any subsequent school year that is greater than the gross production revenue apportionment of the preceding school year shall be exempt from the

1 penalty assessed in this subsection, if the penalty would occur 2 solely as a result of the gross production revenue apportionment, as 3 determined by the State Board of Education.

7. Beginning July 1, 2003, school districts that participate in
consolidation or annexation pursuant to the provisions of the
Oklahoma School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation Act shall be
exempt from the penalty assessed in this subsection for the school
year in which the consolidation or annexation occurs and for the
next three (3) fiscal years.

10 8. Any school district which receives proceeds from a sales tax levied by a municipality pursuant to Section 22-159 of Title 11 of 11 12 the Oklahoma Statutes or proceeds from a sales tax levied by a county pursuant to Section 1370 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes 13 during the 2003-2004 school year or the 2004-2005 school year shall 14 15 be exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if the penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from the 16 sales tax levy. 17

9. Any school district which has an amount of carryover in the
general fund of the district in excess of the limits established in
paragraph 1 of this subsection during the fiscal year years
beginning July 1, 2019 2022, and July 1, 2023, shall not be assessed
a general fund balance penalty as provided for in this subsection.

1 10. For purposes of calculating the general fund balance penalty, the terms "carryover" and "general fund balance" shall not 2 include federal revenue. 3

In order to provide startup funds for the implementation of 4 Η. 5 early childhood programs, State Aid may be advanced to school districts that initially start early childhood instruction at a 6 school site. School districts that desire such advanced funding 7 shall make application to the State Department of Education no later 8 9 than September 15 of each year and advanced funding shall be awarded 10 to the approved districts no later than October 30. The advanced 11 funding shall not exceed the per pupil amount of State Aid as 12 calculated in subsection D of this section per anticipated Head Start eligible student. The total amount of advanced funding shall 13 be proportionately reduced from the monthly payments of the 14 district's State Aid payments during the last six (6) months of the 15 16 same fiscal year.

1. Beginning July 1, 1996, the Oklahoma Tax Commission, 17 I. notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall report 18 monthly to the State Department of Education the monthly 19 apportionment of the following information: 20

2. Beginning July 1, 1997, the State Auditor and Inspector's
 Office, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall

 apportionment of the proceeds of the county levy.

3. Beginning July 1, 1996, the Commissioners of the Land
Office, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall
report monthly to the State Department of Education the monthly
apportionment of state apportionment.

9 4. Beginning July 1, 1997, the county treasurers' offices,
10 notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall report
11 monthly to the State Department of Education the ad valorem tax
12 protest amounts for each county.

5. The information reported by the Tax Commission, the State
Auditor and Inspector's Office, the county treasurers' offices and
the Commissioners of the Land Office, pursuant to this subsection
shall be reported by school district on forms developed by the State
Department of Education.

18 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 18-201.1, as 19 last amended by Section 3, Chapter 61, O.S.L. 2020 (70 O.S. Supp. 20 2020, Section 18-201.1), is amended to read as follows:

21 Section 18-201.1 A. Beginning with the 2020-21 school year, 22 and each school year thereafter, the weighted membership of a school 23 district for calculation of Foundation Aid purposes pursuant to 24 paragraph 1 of subsection D of Section 18-200.1 of this title shall

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1 be the sum of the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil category calculation, the weighted district 2 3 calculation and the weighted teacher experience and degree calculation. The weighted membership of a school district for 4 5 calculation of Salary Incentive Aid purposes pursuant to paragraph 3 of subsection D of Section 18-200.1 of this title shall be the sum 6 7 of the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil category calculation, the weighted district calculation and the 8 9 weighted teacher experience and degree calculation.

10 The Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, the weighted Β. calculations provided for in subsection A of this section shall be 11 12 based on the highest higher weighted average daily membership of the first nine (9) weeks of the current school year, the preceding 13 school year or the second or the preceding school year of a school 14 district, unless otherwise specified. The highest higher of the 15 three (3) two (2) weighted average daily memberships shall be used 16 consistently in all of the calculations; however, the weighted 17 calculation for a statewide virtual charter school experiencing a 18 significant decline in membership shall be based on the first nine 19 (9) weeks of the current school year and not on the preceding school 20 year or the second preceding school year for the statewide virtual 21 charter school. For purposes of this subsection, "significant 22 decline in membership" means equal to or greater than a fifteen 23 percent (15%) decrease in average daily membership from the 24

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preceding school year to the average daily membership of the first nine (9) weeks of the current school year. The average daily membership data used for all calculations in paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4 of this subsection shall be the same as used in the calculation of 5 the State Aid Formula. The weighted calculations provided for in 6 subsection A of this section shall be determined as follows:

7 1. The weighted pupil grade level calculation shall be 8 determined by taking the highest average daily membership and 9 assigning weights to the pupils according to grade attended as 10 follows:

21 Multiply the membership of each subparagraph of this paragraph by 22 the weight assigned to such subparagraph of this paragraph and add 23 the totals together to determine the weighted pupil grade level 24 calculation for a school district. Determination of the pupils

eligible for the early childhood program weight shall be pursuant to 1 the provisions of Section 1-114 of this title. The pupils eligible 2 3 for the out-of-home placement pupil weight shall be students who are not residents of the school district in which they are receiving 4 5 education pursuant to the provisions of subsection D of Section 1-113 of this title. Such weight may be claimed by the district 6 providing educational services to such student for the days that 7 student is enrolled in that district. If claimed, the out-of-home 8 9 placement weight shall be in lieu of the pupil grade level and any 10 pupil category weights for that student. Provided, if a student 11 resides in a juvenile detention center that is restricted to less 12 than twelve (12) beds, the out-of-home placement pupil weight for 13 such students shall be calculated as follows: for a center with six (6) beds - 3.0; for a center with eight (8) beds - 2.3 and for a 14 center with ten (10) beds - 1.80. 15

1 through d of paragraph 1 of Section 1210.301 of this title or (2) 2 the sum of the number of students who scored in the top three 3 percent (3%) on any national standardized test of intellectual ability plus eight percent (8%) of the total average daily 4 5 membership of the school district for the preceding school year. For the 1997-98 school year and subsequent school years, the number 6 7 to be multiplied by the weight assigned to the gifted category in subparagraph g of this paragraph shall be the lesser of (1) the sum 8 9 of the number of students who scored in the top three percent (3%) 10 on any national standardized test of intellectual ability plus the 11 number of students identified as gifted pursuant to subparagraphs a 12 through d of paragraph 1 of Section 1210.301 of this title, or (2) the sum of the number of students who scored in the top three 13 percent (3%) on any national standardized test of intellectual 14 15 ability plus eight percent (8%) of the total average daily membership of the school district for the first nine (9) weeks of 16 the school year. 17

3. The weighted district calculation shall be determined by determining the calculations for each school district for both the small school district formula and the district sparsity - isolation formula, applying whichever is the greater of the calculations of the two formulas and then applying the restrictions pursuant to subparagraph c of this paragraph.

a. Small school district formula: 529 minus the average
 daily membership divided by 529 times .2 times total
 average daily membership.

The small school district formula calculation shall apply 4 5 only to school districts whose highest average daily membership is less than 529 pupils. School districts which 6 7 are consolidated or annexed after July 1, 2003, pursuant to the Oklahoma School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation 8 9 Act shall have the weighted district size calculation for the three (3) school years following the fiscal year in 10 which such consolidation occurred calculated to be the sum 11 12 of the individual consolidated districts computed as if the consolidation had not taken place. Thereafter, any such 13 district which is consolidated pursuant to the Oklahoma 14 School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation Act shall not 15 qualify for the weighted district calculation unless the 16 district can satisfy the specifications herein. Subject to 17 the provisions of subparagraph c of this paragraph, the 18 resulting number shall be counted as additional students 19 for the purpose of calculating State Aid. 20

b. District sparsity - isolation formula:
The district sparsity - isolation formula calculation shall
apply only to school districts:

1	(1) whose total area in square miles is greater than

(2)	whose areal density is less than one-fourth $(1/4)$
	of the state average areal density. Areal
	density shall be determined by dividing the
	school district's average daily membership by the

school district's total area in square miles. The district sparsity - isolation formula calculation shall be calculated as follows:

The school district student cost factor multiplied by the school district area factor. The resulting product shall be multiplied by the school district's average daily membership. Subject to the provisions of subparagraph c of this paragraph, the resulting number shall be counted as additional students for the purpose of calculating State Aid.

18 The school district student cost factor shall be calculated 19 as follows:

The school district's average daily membership shall be categorized into the following grade level groups and applied to the appropriate formulas as computed below:

The State Board of Education shall define geographical barriers 3 whose location in a school district would inhibit the district from 4 5 consolidation or annexation. The Board shall make available an application process, review applications, and for districts the 6 7 Board deems necessary allow additional square miles to be used for the purposes of calculations used for the weighted district sparsity 8 9 - isolation formula. Provided, that the additional square miles 10 allowed for geographical barriers shall not exceed thirty percent (30%) of the district's actual size. 11

State Aid funds which a district is calculated to 12 с. receive as a result of the weighted district 13 calculation shall be restricted as follows: 14 15 If, after the weighted district calculation is applied, the district's projected per pupil 16 revenue exceeds one hundred fifty percent (150%) 17 of the projected state average per pupil revenue, 18 then the district's State Aid shall be reduced by 19 an amount that will restrict the district's 20 projected per pupil revenue to one hundred fifty 21 percent (150%) of the projected state average per 22 pupil revenue. Provided, in applying the 23 restriction provided in this division, the 24

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district's State Aid shall not be reduced by an amount greater than by the amount of State Aid which was generated by the weighted district calculation.

5 The July calculation of the projected per pupil revenue shall be determined by dividing the highest of 6 7 the district's preceding two (2) years year's average daily membership (ADM) as weighted by the pupil grade 8 9 level, the pupil category, the district and the 10 teacher experience degree index calculations for 11 projected State Aid into the district's projected 12 total revenues including projected funds for the State Aid Formula for the preceding year, net assessed 13 valuation for the preceding calendar year times 14 thirty-nine (39) mills, county revenues excluding the 15 county four-mills revenues for the second preceding 16 year, other state appropriations for the preceding 17 year and the collections for the preceding year of 18 state apportionment, motor vehicle revenue, gross 19 production tax and R.E.A. tax. 20 The December calculation of the projected per pupil 21 revenue shall be determined by dividing the highest 22 higher of the district's first nine (9) weeks of the 23

current school year or the <del>two (2)</del> preceding school

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1 years year's average daily membership (ADM) as 2 weighted by the pupil grade level, the pupil category, 3 the district and the teacher experience degree index calculations for projected State Aid into the 4 5 district's projected total revenues including funds for the December calculation of the current year State 6 Aid Formula, net assessed valuation for the current 7 calendar year times thirty-nine (39) mills, county 8 9 revenues excluding the county four-mills revenue for 10 the preceding year, other state appropriations for the preceding year and the collections for the preceding 11 12 year of state apportionment, motor vehicle revenue, gross production tax and R.E.A. tax. 13 The district's projected total revenues for each 14 calculation shall exclude the following collections 15 16 for the second preceding year: federal revenue, insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of 17 overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior 18 expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and 19 other local miscellaneous revenues. 20

4. The weighted teacher experience and degree calculation shall
be determined in accordance with the teacher experience and degree
index. The State Department of Education shall determine an index
for each state teacher by using data supplied in the school

1 district's teacher personnel reports of the preceding year and 2 utilizing the index as follows:

The school district teacher index for each school district shall 12 be determined by subtracting the weighted average state teacher from 13 the weighted average district teacher. Multiply the school district 14 teacher index if greater than zero by .7 and then multiply that 15 product by the sum of the district's weighted pupil grade level 16 calculation provided in paragraph 1 of this subsection and the 17 weighted pupil category calculation provided in subparagraph m of 18 paragraph 2 of this subsection to determine the weighted teacher 19 experience and degree calculation. 20
