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11	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:		
12	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 11-103.6, as		
13	last amended by Section 4, Chapter 345, O.S.L. 2021, is amended to		
14	read as follows:		
15	Section 11-103.6. A. 1. The State Board of Education shall		
16	adopt subject matter standards for instruction of students in the		
17	public schools of this state that are necessary to ensure there is		
18	attainment of desired levels of competencies in a variety of areas		
19	to include language, mathematics, science, social studies,		
20	communication, and health and physical education.		
21	2. School districts shall develop and implement curriculum,		
22	courses and instruction in order to ensure that students meet the		
23	skills and competencies as set forth in this section and in the		
24	subject matter standards adopted by the State Board of Education.		

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1 3. All students shall gain literacy at the elementary and secondary levels. Students shall develop skills in reading, 2 writing, speaking, computing, and critical thinking. For purposes 3 of this section, critical thinking means a manner of analytical 4 5 thinking which is logical and uses linear factual analysis to reach a conclusion. They shall learn about cultures and environments -6 their own and those of others with whom they share the earth. All 7 students shall receive the instruction needed to lead healthy and 8 9 physically active lifestyles. Students, therefore, shall study 10 social studies, literature, languages, the arts, health, mathematics, and science. Such curricula shall provide for the 11 12 teaching of a hands-on career exploration program in cooperation with technology center schools. 13

4. The subject matter standards shall be designed to teach the competencies for which students shall be tested as provided in Section 1210.508 of this title and shall be designed to prepare all students for active citizenship, employment, and/or successful completion of postsecondary education without the need for remedial coursework at the postsecondary level.

20 5. The subject matter standards shall be designed with rigor as 21 defined in paragraph 3 of subsection \mp G of this section.

22 6. The subject matter standards for English Language Arts shall23 give Classic Literature and nonfiction literature equal

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consideration to other literature. In addition, emphasis shall be
 given to the study of complete works of literature.

7. At a minimum, the subject matter standards for mathematics shall require mastery of the standard algorithms in mathematics, which is the most logical, efficient way of solving a problem that consistently works, and for students to attain fluency in Euclidian geometry.

8 8. The subject matter standards for history, social studies, 9 and United States Government shall include the content of the United 10 States naturalization test, with an emphasis on the specific content 11 of the test and the ideas and concepts it references. The United 12 States naturalization test shall be made available in physical and 13 electronic online formats as an optional assessment tool for 14 teachers.

9. The subject matter standards for United States Government
shall include an emphasis on civics. For the purposes of this
section, "civics" means the study of the rights and duties of
Oklahoma and United States citizens and of how those governments
work.

20 10. The subject matter standards for health and physical 21 education shall include but not be limited to the domains of 22 physical, emotional, social, and intellectual health. Health 23 literacy shall include the ability to obtain, process, and 24 understand basic health information and services needed to make

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1 appropriate health decisions. Health shall also include the 2 importance of proper nutrition and exercise, mental health and wellness, substance abuse, coping skills for understanding and 3 managing trauma, establishing and maintaining positive 4 5 relationships, and responsible decision making. Physical literacy shall include the ability to move with competence and confidence in 6 a wide variety of physical activities in multiple environments that 7 benefit the healthy development of the whole person. 8

9 B. Subject to the provisions of subsection C of this section, 10 in order to graduate from a public high school accredited by the 11 State Board of Education with a standard diploma, students shall 12 complete the following college preparatory/work ready curriculum 13 units or sets of competencies at the secondary level:

Four units or sets of competencies of English to include
 Grammar, Composition, Literature, or any English course approved for
 college admission requirements;

Three units or sets of competencies of mathematics, limited
 to Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, Trigonometry, Math Analysis,
 Calculus, Advanced Placement Statistics, or any mathematics course
 with content and/or rigor above Algebra I and approved for college
 admission requirements;

3. Three units or sets of competencies of laboratory science
approved for college admission requirements including one unit or
set of competencies of life science meeting the standards for

Biology I; one unit or set of competencies of physical science meeting the standards for Physical Science, Chemistry, or Physics; and one unit or set of competencies from the domains of physical science, life science, or earth and space science such that the content and rigor is above Biology I or Physical Science;

4. Three units or sets of competencies of history and
citizenship skills including one unit of American History, 1/2 unit
of Oklahoma History, 1/2 unit of United States Government, and one
unit from the subjects of History, Government, Geography, Economics,
Civics, or non-Western culture and approved for college admission
requirements;

12 5. Two units or sets of competencies of the same world or non-13 English language or two units of computer technology approved for 14 college admission requirements, whether taught at a high school or a 15 technology center school, including computer programming, hardware, 16 and business computer applications, such as word processing, 17 databases, spreadsheets, and graphics, excluding keyboarding or 18 typing courses;

One additional unit or set of competencies selected from
 paragraphs 1 through 5 of this subsection or career and technology
 education courses, concurrently enrolled courses, Advanced Placement
 <u>advanced placement</u> courses, or International Baccalaureate courses
 approved for college admission requirements; and

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7. One unit or set of competencies of fine arts, such as music,
 art, or drama, or one unit or set of competencies of speech.

In lieu of the requirements of subsection B of this section 3 С. which requires a college preparatory/work ready curriculum, a 4 5 student may enroll in the core curriculum as provided in subsection D of this section upon written approval of the parent or legal 6 guardian of the student. For students under the age of eighteen 7 (18) school districts shall require a parent or legal guardian of 8 9 the student to meet with a designee of the school prior to enrollment in the core curriculum. The State Department of 10 Education shall develop and distribute to school districts a form 11 12 suitable for this purpose, which shall include information on the benefits to students of completing the college preparatory/work 13 ready curriculum as provided for in subsection B of this section. 14

D. For those students subject to the requirements of subsection C of this section, in order to graduate from a public high school accredited by the State Board of Education with a standard diploma, students shall complete the following core curriculum units or sets of competencies at the secondary level:

- 21 following courses:
- 22 a. World History,
- 23 b. Geography,
- 24 c. Economics,

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- d. Anthropology, or

2 other social studies courses with content and/or rigor e. equal to or above United States History, United States 3 Government, and Oklahoma History; 4 5 5. Arts - 1 unit or set of competencies which may include, but is not limited to, courses in Visual Arts and General Music; and 6 6. Computer Education or World Language - 1 unit or set of 7 competencies of computer technology, whether taught at a high school 8 9 or a technology center $school_{\tau}$ including computer programming, 10 hardware, and business computer applications, such as word 11 processing, databases, spreadsheets, and graphics, excluding 12 keyboarding or typing courses, or 1 unit or set of competencies of world or non-English language. 13 The State Board of Education may develop rules to determine Ε. 14 if courses on aviation are eligible for non-elective academic credit 15

16 <u>toward meeting the graduation requirements set forth in subsections</u>
17 <u>B and D of this section.</u>

18 <u>F.</u> 1. In addition to the curriculum requirements of either 19 subsection B or D of this section, in order to graduate from a 20 public high school accredited by the State Board of Education 21 students shall complete the requirements for a personal financial 22 literacy passport as set forth in the Passport to Financial Literacy 23 Act and any additional course requirements or recommended elective 24 courses as may be established by the State Board of Education and

1 the district school board. School districts shall strongly 2 encourage students to complete two units or sets of competencies of 3 world languages and two units or sets of competencies of physical 4 and health education.

2. No student shall receive credit for high school graduation
more than once for completion of the same unit or set of
competencies to satisfy the curriculum requirements of this section.

3. A school district shall not be required to offer every
9 course listed in subsections B and D of this section but shall offer
10 sufficient courses to allow a student to meet the graduation
11 requirements during the secondary grade years of the student.

12 F. G. For purposes of this section:

13 1. "Contextual methodology" means academic content and skills
 14 taught by utilizing real-world problems and projects in a way that
 15 helps students understand the application of that knowledge;

2. "Qualified agricultural education courses" means courses 16 that have been determined by the State Board of Education to offer 17 the sets of competencies for one or more science content areas and 18 which correspond to academic science courses. Qualified 19 agricultural education courses shall include, but are not limited 20 to, Horticulture horticulture, Plant plant and Soil Science soil 21 science, Natural Resources natural resources and Environmental 22 Science environmental science, and Animal Science animal science. 23 The courses shall be taught by teachers certified in agricultural 24

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education and comply with all rules of the Oklahoma Department of
 Career and Technology Education;

3 3. "Rigor" means a level of difficulty that is thorough,
4 exhaustive and accurate and is appropriate for the grade level;
5 4. "Sets of competencies" means instruction in those skills and
6 competencies that are specified in the subject matter standards
7 adopted by the State Board of Education and other skills and
8 competencies adopted by the Board, without regard to specified

9 instructional time; and

"Unit" means a Carnegie Unit as defined by the North Central
 Association's Commission on Schools.

12 G. H. 1. The State Board of Education shall adopt a plan to 13 ensure that rigor is maintained in the content, teaching 14 methodology, level of expectations for student achievement, and 15 application of learning in all the courses taught to meet the 16 graduation requirements as specified in this section.

17 2. The State Board of Education shall allow as much flexibility 18 at the district level as is possible without diminishing the rigor 19 or undermining the intent of providing these courses. To accomplish 20 this purpose, the State Department of Education shall work with 21 school districts in reviewing and approving courses taught by 22 districts that are not specifically listed in subsections B and D of 23 this section. Options may include, but shall not be limited to,

courses taken by concurrent enrollment, advanced placement, or
 correspondence, or courses bearing different titles.

3 3. The State Board of Education shall approve an advanced
4 placement computer science course to meet the requirements of course
5 competencies listed in paragraph 2 of subsection B of this section
6 if the course is taken in a student's senior year and the student is
7 concurrently enrolled in or has successfully completed Algebra II.

Technology center school districts may offer programs 8 4. 9 designed in cooperation with institutions of higher education which have an emphasis on a focused field of career study upon approval of 10 the State Board of Education and the independent district board of 11 12 education. Students in the tenth grade may be allowed to attend these programs for up to one-half (1/2) of a school day and credit 13 for the units or sets of competencies required in paragraphs 2, 3, 14 and 6 of subsection B or D of this section shall be given if the 15 courses are taught by a teacher certified in the secondary subject 16 area; provided, credit for units or sets of competencies pursuant to 17 subsection B of this section shall be approved for college admission 18 requirements. 19

5. If a student enrolls in a concurrent course, the school district shall not be responsible for any costs incurred for that course, unless the school district does not offer enough course selection during the student's secondary grade years to allow the student to receive the courses needed to meet the graduation

requirements of this section. If the school district does not offer the necessary course selection during the student's secondary grade years, it shall be responsible for the cost of resident tuition at an institution in The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, fees, and books for the concurrent enrollment course, and providing for transportation to and from the institution to the school site.

It is the intent of the Legislature that for students enrolled 7 in a concurrent enrollment course which is paid for by the school 8 9 district pursuant to this paragraph, the institution charge only the 10 supplementary and special service fees that are directly related to the concurrent enrollment course and enrollment procedures for that 11 12 student. It is further the intent of the Legislature that fees for student activities and student service facilities including the 13 student health care and cultural and recreational service fees not 14 be charged to such students. 15

6. Credit for the units or sets of competencies required in
subsection B or D of this section shall be given when such units or
sets of competencies are taken prior to ninth grade if the teachers
are certified or authorized to teach the subjects for high school
credit and the required rigor is maintained.

7. The three units or sets of competencies in mathematics required in subsection B or D of this section shall be completed in the ninth through twelfth grades. If a student completes any required courses or sets of competencies in mathematics prior to

1 ninth grade, the student may take any other mathematics courses or 2 sets of competencies to fulfill the requirement to complete three 3 units or sets of competencies in grades nine through twelve after 4 the student has satisfied the requirements of subsection B or D of 5 this section.

8. All units or sets of competencies required for graduation 6 may be taken in any sequence recommended by the school district. 7 H. I. As a condition of receiving accreditation from the State 8 9 Board of Education, all students in grades nine through twelve shall enroll in a minimum of six periods, or the equivalent in block 10 scheduling or other scheduling structure that allows for instruction 11 12 in sets of competencies, of rigorous academic and/or rigorous vocational courses each day, which may include arts, vocal and 13 instrumental music, speech classes, and physical education classes. 14 I. J. 1. Academic and vocational-technical courses designed to 15 offer sets of competencies integrated or embedded within the course 16 that provide for the teaching and learning of the appropriate skills 17 and knowledge in the subject matter standards, as adopted by the 18 State Board of Education, may upon approval of the Board, in 19 consultation with the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology 20 Education if the courses are offered at a technology center school 21 district, be counted for academic credit and toward meeting the 22 graduation requirements of this section. 23

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2. Internet-based courses offered by a technology center school that are taught by a certified teacher and provide for the teaching and learning of the appropriate skills and knowledge in the subject matter standards may, upon approval of the State Board of Education and the independent district board of education, be counted for academic credit and toward meeting the graduation requirements of this section.

Internet-based courses or vocational-technical courses 8 3. 9 utilizing integrated or embedded skills for which no subject matter 10 standards have been adopted by the State Board of Education may be approved by the Board, in consultation with the Oklahoma Department 11 12 of Career and Technology Education if the courses are offered at a technology center school district, if such courses incorporate 13 standards of nationally recognized professional organizations and 14 are taught by certified teachers. 15

4. Courses offered by a supplemental education organization 16 that is accredited by a national accrediting body and that are 17 taught by a certified teacher and provide for the teaching and 18 learning of the appropriate skills and knowledge in the subject 19 matter standards may, upon approval of the State Board of Education 20 and the school district board of education, be counted for academic 21 credit and toward meeting the graduation requirements of this 22 section. 23

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J. K. The State Board of Education shall provide an option for
 high school graduation based upon attainment of the desired levels
 of competencies as required in tests pursuant to the provisions of
 Section 1210.508 of this title. Such option shall be in lieu of the
 amount of course credits earned.

K. L. The State Board of Education shall prescribe, adopt and
approve a promotion system based on the attainment by students of
specified levels of competencies in each area of the core
curriculum.

10 L. M. Children who have individualized education programs 11 pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), 12 and who satisfy the graduation requirements through the 13 individualized education program for that student shall be awarded a 14 standard diploma.

15 <u>M. N.</u> Students who enter the ninth grade in or prior to the 16 2007-08 school year who are enrolled in an alternative education 17 program and meet the requirements of their plans leading to high 18 school graduation developed pursuant to Section 1210.568 of this 19 title shall be awarded a standard diploma.

20 N. O. Any student who completes the curriculum requirements of 21 the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program shall be awarded a 22 standard diploma.

23 O. P. Any student who successfully completes an advanced
 24 mathematics or science course offered pursuant to Section 1210.404

of this title shall be granted academic credit toward meeting the
 graduation requirements pursuant to paragraph 2 or 3, as
 appropriate, of subsection B or D of this section.

4 P. Q. For purposes of this section, the courses approved for
5 college admission requirements shall be courses which are approved
6 by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education for admission to
7 an institution within The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education.

Q. R. Students who have been denied a standard diploma by the 8 9 school district in which the student is or was enrolled for failing 10 to meet the requirements of this section may re-enroll in the school district that denied the student a standard diploma following the 11 12 denial of a standard diploma. The student shall be provided remediation or intervention and the opportunity to complete the 13 curriculum units or sets of competencies required by this section to 14 obtain a standard diploma. Students who re-enroll in the school 15 district to meet the graduation requirements of this section shall 16 be exempt from the hourly instructional requirements of Section 1-17 111 of this title and the six-period enrollment requirements of this 18 section. 19

20 R. S. The State Department of Education shall collect and 21 report data by school site and district on the number of students 22 who enroll in the core curriculum as provided in subsection D of 23 this section.
