**Research Analysis**

The committee substitute for HB1198 creates the State House of Representatives Redistricting Act of 2021.

The measure designates the Census Bureau’s American Community Survey (ACS) Five-Year Estimates for 2015-2019 as the best alternative population data available for legislative redistricting and directs the Legislature to use ACS data to draft redistricting legislation.

According to the United States Census Bureau’s ACS Five-Year Estimates for 2015-2019, Oklahoma’s total population is 3,932,870. For the purposes of redistricting the 101 state House districts, each district should have an ideal population of 38,939 people. The delineation of each House district is based on the following Census geography: counties, tracts, block groups and block.

The new district boundaries will take effect on the 15<sup>th</sup> days following the General Election in November 2022. The State Election Board will conduct elections for state House districts in 2022 in accordance with the act under the new district lines.

The measure also repeals the State House of Representatives Redistricting Act of 2011.
