## **Research Analysis**

HB 2022 replaces the temporary medical marijuana license, which was to be granted to any license-holder from another state with a medical marijuana program, with a nonresident medical marijuana patient license. To qualify for a nonresident patient license, the applicant must be at least 18 years old and have their application signed by an Oklahoma physician. A qualifying medical condition is not required for a nonresident patient license, but the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority (OMMA) may contact the recommending physician to verify the applicant's need. The application fee for the nonresident patient license is \$200, and the license is valid for up to two years unless the physician terminates the recommendation or OMMA revokes the license.

## **Fiscal Analysis**

The fiscal impact is unknown. There is a potential change in licensing revenue as this replaces the current 30 day, out-of-state licenses for patient card holders from other states. We may see an increased use of this patient licensing option given the increased length of licensure for out-of-state patients despite the increased fee. However, some out-of-state patients may see the increased fee as prohibitive. Licensing funds are under the jurisdiction of OSDH and do not come to OMMA.
