**Research Analysis**

The committee substitute to HB 3319 defines the following terms:

- Board
- health care employer
- healthcare provider

The CS authorizes the licensing staff of the Board of Osteopathic Examiners or the State Board of Medical Licensure and Supervision to grant a temporary license to a health care provider under certain conditions. The temporary license will expire ninety days after the expiration of the state or national emergency declaration. The CS also prohibits certain health care providers who are issued a temporary license to initiate a prescription for controlled drugs, including opioids, without obtaining the proper permits from certain agencies.

The measure requires a physician to submit an application through a form developed by the Board which must contain certain information. The CS allows the Board to issue temporary licenses pursuant to the requirements of this act. The measure declares an emergency.
