**Fiscal Analysis**

SB 1720 allows a private certification organization to register with the Secretary of State and meet certain requirements for occupational certification. It allows an individual to lawfully practice an occupation if privately certified, as long as they properly display that they are privately certified and shall not claim to be occupationally regulated by the government.

Since this legislation contains provisions allowing for private certification of occupations, it is unknown if any would actually participate. Oklahoma has a wide variety of government occupational licenses from hair braiding to perfusionists. Many of the licensing boards are self-funded but since many of those boards also pay 10% of their fees into the GR fund, then GR could be minimally affected.
