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9	An Act relating to public health and safety; amending 63 O.S. 2021, Section 1-553.1, which relates to summary of mammography report for patient; changing the breast density notice; and providing an effective date.
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14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
15	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 63 O.S. 2021, Section 1-553.1, is
16	amended to read as follows:
17	Section 1-553.1 A. All health care facilities that perform
18	mammography examinations shall include in the summary of the
19	mammography report, required by federal law to be provided to a
20	patient, information that identifies the patient's individual breast
21	density classification based on the Breast Imaging Reporting and
22	Data System established by the American College of Radiology as
23	dense or not dense. If the patient elects to receive the summary of
24	the mammography report by electronic mail and provides an electronic

mail address, the summary shall be sent by electronic mail. If the facility determines that a patient has heterogeneously or extremely dense breast tissue, the summary of the mammography report shall include the following notice:

"Your mammogram indicates that you have dense breast tissue.

Dense breast tissue is common and is found in more than fifty

percent (50%) of women and is not abnormal. However, dense breast

tissue may make it more difficult to detect breast cancer and may be

associated with an increased risk of breast cancer. This

information is being provided to raise your awareness and to

encourage you and your health care provider to discuss this and

other breast cancer risk factors. Together, you and your health

care provider can decide if additional screening options may be

right for you. A report of your results was sent to your health

care provider."

"Breast tissue can be either dense or not dense. Dense tissue

makes it harder to find breast cancer on a mammogram and also raises

the risk of developing breast cancer. Your breast tissue is dense.

In some people with dense tissue, other imaging tests in addition to

a mammogram may help find cancers. Talk to your health care

provider about breast density, risks for breast cancer, and your

individual situation."

B. Patients who receive diagnostic or screening mammograms may be directed to informative material about breast density. This

1	informative material may include the American College of Radiology's
2	most current brochure on the subject of breast density available on
3	the American College of Radiology's website. Patients and health
4	care providers can be further informed by material from the American
5	Cancer Society or Mammography Saves Lives organizations.
6	C. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to create a duty of
7	care or other legal obligation beyond the duty to provide notice as
8	set forth in subsection A of this section. Nothing in this section
9	shall be deemed to require a notice that is inconsistent with the
10	provisions of the federal Mammography Quality Standards Act or any
11	regulations promulgated pursuant thereto.
12	SECTION 2. This act shall become effective November 1, 2024.
