**Research Analysis**

HB3071 prohibits state revenue from being used to provide benefits to illegal immigrants, excluding any costs related to jailing or transporting an illegal immigrant to an out-of-state destination.

**CHANGES MADE IN THE FLOOR SUBSTITUTE:**

Adds additional exemptions to the definition of the term "benefit", including any costs associated with:

- Law enforcement agencies or personnel to investigate incidents involving domestic violence;
- Law enforcement agencies or personnel to investigate incidents involving human trafficking; or
- Providing education to children from pre-kindergarten through the twelfth grade.

Provides that victim service programs certified by the Office of Attorney General to provide domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking services to a person are not restricted if the services are required pursuant to federal law.

**Fiscal Analysis**

The floor amendment to HB 3071 prohibits the use of any state revenues to be knowingly used to provide benefits to an unauthorized person present in the state. The floor amendment adds various exclusions for costs incurred for specific scenarios.

As written, this measure would apply to all state agencies, and thus all state agencies would have to enact policies to ensure compliance with this measure. As the policies would vary between state agencies, a true fiscal impact of this measure cannot be determined at this time.
