7	An Act relating to the Oklahoma Crime Victims
8	Compensation Act; amending 21 O.S. 2021, Sections 142.10 and 142.13, which relate to award of
9	compensation and payment of award; increasing time to file certain claim; removing certain reporting requirement; providing exception to grounds for
10	diminishing certain award; increasing amounts of certain compensation; and providing an effective
11	date.
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14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
15	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 21 O.S. 2021, Section 142.10, is
16	amended to read as follows:
17	Section 142.10. A. Compensation shall not be awarded:
18	1. Unless the claim has been filed with the Crime Victims
19	Compensation Board within <del>one (1) year</del> five (5) years after the
20	injury or death upon which the claim is based. If the victim is
21	under a mental or cognitive disability or is a child under eighteer
22	(18) years of age, the Board may use the date the criminal incident
23	was disclosed to a responsible adult when establishing whether or
24 27	not the claim was timely filed. In cases involving sexual assault

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of an adult eighteen (18) years of age or older, the Board may use the date the sexual assault forensic evidence kit was tested when establishing whether the claim was timely filed. The Board may, at its discretion, extend the filing period beyond one (1) year upon a showing of good cause or in all cases of sexual assault;

6 2. To a claimant who was the offender, or an accomplice of the 7 offender; or

8 3. To another person if the award would unjustly benefit the
9 offender or accomplice; or

10 4. Unless the criminally injurious conduct resulting in injury 11 or death was reported to a law enforcement officer within seventy-12 two (72) hours after its occurrence, or in the case of sexual 13 assault, the victim undergoes a forensic medical examination within 14 one hundred twenty (120) hours after its occurrence or the Board 15 finds there was good cause for the failure to report the crime or 16 obtain a forensic medical examination within that time.

B. Compensation otherwise payable to a claimant shall be
diminished to the extent:

19 1. That the economic loss is recouped from collateral sources; 20 or

21 2. Of the degree of responsibility for the cause of the injury 22 or death attributable to the victim as determined by the Board. 23 <u>Provided, the Board shall not find an injury attributable to the</u> 24

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victim where a self-inflicted injury is a result of the crime committed against the victim.

C. The Board, upon finding that the claimant or victim has not fully cooperated with appropriate law enforcement agencies, may deny, withdraw or reduce an award of compensation. Victims of sexual assault who undergo a forensic medical examination within one hundred twenty (120) hours after the sexual assault shall be found to have fully cooperated. The Board may extend this period of time for good cause.

10 The Board, on its own motion or on request of the claimant, D. 11 may reconsider a decision granting or denying an award or 12 determining its amount. The motion or request to reconsider a 13 decision shall be made within six (6) months from the date of the 14 last action by the Board on the claim at issue. An order on 15 reconsideration of an award shall not require a refund of amounts 16 previously paid, unless the award was obtained by fraud. The right 17 of reconsideration does not affect the finality of a Board decision 18 for the purpose of judicial review. On claims which are denied by 19 the Board, reconsideration may only be granted within six (6) months 20 of the last Board action.

E. The provisions of subsections A and B of this section shall not apply to claimants eligible for compensation pursuant to the Murrah Crime Victims Compensation Act who make claims under the Oklahoma Crime Victims Compensation Act.

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SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 21 O.S. 2021, Section 142.13, is amended to read as follows:

Section 142.13. A. The Crime Victims Compensation Board may compensate for work loss, replacement services loss, dependent's economic loss and dependent's replacement service loss. Compensation for a caregiver who has out-of-pocket wage loss as a result of caring for the victim who was injured as a result of criminally injurious conduct may not exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00).

10 Compensation payable to a victim and to all other claimants в. 11 sustaining economic loss because of injury to or death of that 12 victim may not exceed <del>Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00)</del> Forty 13 Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) in the aggregate. The Board may, 14 after approval of an initial award of Twenty Thousand Dollars 15 (\$20,000.00) Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00), grant an 16 additional sum not to exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) 17 Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00), specifically for loss of wages 18 for the victim or loss of support for dependents of a deceased 19 victim provided, there is verifiable economic loss after deducting 20 payments from other sources. In no event shall compensation payable 21 to a victim and to all other claimants sustaining economic loss 22 because of injury to or death of that victim exceed Forty Thousand 23 Dollars (\$40,000.00) Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000.00) in the 24 aggregate.

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C. The Board may provide for the payment to a claimant in a lump sum or in installments. At the request of the claimant, the Board may convert future economic loss, other than allowable expense, to a lump sum.

5 D. An award payable in a lump sum or installments for loss of 6 support for a dependent of the deceased victim may be computed 7 through a formula which calculates the net loss of support for 8 dependents based upon an estimated date of retirement or an 9 estimated date of adulthood for dependent children, beginning with 10 the date of death of the victim and ending with the least of one of 11 the following time periods for each dependent filing loss of 12 support:

13 1. The amount of time from the date of death of the victim to 14 the date the victim would have been expected to reach sixty-two (62) 15 years of age;

16 2. The amount of time from the date of death of the victim to 17 the date the spouse of the victim is expected to reach sixty-two 18 (62) years of age; or

19 3. The amount of time from the date of death of the victim to 20 the date a dependent child is expected to reach eighteen (18) years 21 of age or twenty-three (23) years of age if the dependent child is 22 enrolled as a full-time student. An award payable in installments 23 for future loss of support may be modified by the Board in the event 24 a dependent child receiving loss of support is between the ages of

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eighteen (18) and twenty-three (23) years of age and is no longer enrolled as a full-time student, the dependent dies before all installments are paid or the dependent receiving installments moves and leaves no forwarding address with the Board office.

E. An award shall not be subject to execution, attachment, garnishment or other process, except for child support and except that an award for allowable expense shall not be exempt from a claim of a creditor to the extent that such creditor has provided products, services or accommodations, the costs of which are included in the award.

F. An assignment by the claimant to any future award under the provisions of this act is unenforceable, except:

13 1. An assignment of any award for work loss to assure payment 14 of court ordered alimony, maintenance or child support; or

15 2. An assignment of any award for allowable expense to the 16 extent that the benefits are for the cost of products, services or 17 accommodations necessitated by the injury or death on which the 18 claim is based and are provided or to be provided by the assignee.

19 G. The Board may, in its discretion, approve payment of crisis 20 counseling, occurring within three (3) years of the crime, in an 21 amount not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for each 22 family member of a homicide victim; provided, the counselor is a 23 qualified mental health care provider. Medical and pharmaceutical

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<sup>1</sup> treatment is not compensable for any family member of a deceased <sup>2</sup> victim.

3 Η. Outpatient counseling expenses for a victim of criminally 4 injurious conduct may be considered by the Board provided the 5 counseling is focused on the crime and the counselor is a qualified 6 mental health care provider. A total not to exceed Three Thousand 7 Dollars (\$3,000.00) may be awarded for individual counseling 8 sessions for victims of criminally injurious conduct. Sessions 9 between the mental health care provider and nonoffending parents of 10 a victimized child under eighteen (18) years of age may also be 11 included in the award provided the combined total for the counseling 12 and parental sessions do not exceed Three Thousand Dollars 13 (\$3,000.00) and the parental sessions relate to the victimization. 14 In extreme cases, the Board may, in its discretion, waive the three-15 thousand-dollar limit. Inpatient mental health treatment will be 16 reviewed on a case-by-case basis and may be compensated, at the 17 discretion of the Board, in an amount not to exceed Twenty Thousand 18 Dollars (\$20,000.00).

19 I. Reasonable funeral, cremation or burial expenses shall not 20 exceed Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00).

J. Reasonable costs associated with crime scene cleanup shall not exceed Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00).

K. Loss of income of a caregiver shall not exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00).

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1	L. Reasonable costs for vehicle impound fees are limited to
2	violent crimes occurring in a vehicle owned by the victim of the
3	violent crime or an eligible claimant, provided such fee is
4	associated with the collection and security of crime scene evidence.
5	Reimbursement for vehicle impound fees shall not exceed Seven
6	Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00).
7	SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2023.
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
