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14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
15	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY Section 5, Chapter 361, O.S.L.
16	2023 (40 O.S. Supp. 2024, Section 904), is amended to read as
17	follows:
18	Section 904. The Oklahoma Workforce Commission shall have the
19	following powers, duties, and responsibilities:
20	1. To administer the provisions of this act the Oklahoma
21	Workforce Transformation Act or any duty as directed by statute;
22	2. To establish an office for the Commission within this state;
23	3. To elect whatever other officers may be necessary to direct

operations of the Commission;

- 4. To employ or contract for personnel and administrative support as the Commission deems appropriate to carry out the purpose and provisions of this act the Oklahoma Workforce Transformation

 Act, including, but not limited to, a nonprofit corporation to carry out the Commission's objectives, an Executive Director executive director or other chief executive officer, and any other employees or contractors the Commission deems appropriate, and to prescribe their duties and fix their compensation;
 - 5. To administer the Workforce Coordination Revolving Fund created in Section 255.4 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes;
 - 6. To approve or disapprove the budget of the Commission;
 - 7. To promulgate rules to carry out the provisions of this act the Oklahoma Workforce Transformation Act;
 - 8. To enter into contracts or agreements for studies, professional services, grant administration and procurement, research projects, supplies, or any other services the Commission deems necessary to carry out its purpose, and to incur those expenses necessary to carry out those purposes;
 - 9. To cooperate with any private, local, state, or national commission, organization, agency, or group and to make contracts and agreements for joint programs beneficial to Oklahoma's workforce development efforts;
 - 10. To accept donations, grants, contributions, and gifts from any public or private source and deposit such in the Workforce

- Coordination Revolving Fund, created in Section 255.4 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

 11. To oversee and direct to the extent permitted by law the
 - 11. To oversee and direct to the extent permitted by law the activities and administration of the Governor's Council for Workforce and Economic Development, including, but not limited to, the creation and submission of state plans to the federal government pursuant to the provisions of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act;
 - 12. To collect data from federal, state, and local agencies, departments, educational institutions, boards, commissions, or any other entities including, but not limited to:
 - a. number of participants in workforce development programming,
 - b. cost per participant,
 - c. wages before and after participation in programs,
 - d. degree or certificate conferred on each participant,
 - e. number of jobs open needing degrees or certificates,
 - f. labor force and economic information, and
 - g. any other information the Commission deems appropriate to guide funding decisions, facilitate its work or the work of workforce development entities in the state, or to understand the impact of the state's workforce efforts and programming;

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1	13. To create and maintain a public dashboard and create
2	reports with data concerning workforce development efforts in the
3	state. All state and local agencies, departments, educational
4	institutions, boards, commissions, and other public entities shall
5	cooperate with information and data requests from the Commission or
6	its designees. It is the intent of the Legislature that the
7	Oklahoma Workforce Commission serve as the centralized data and
8	information repository for workforce development activities for the
9	state; and

- 14. To make recommendations to the Legislature to improve workforce development programs in the state; and
- 15. To implement programs designed to expand workforce 12 13 development.
 - SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 905 of Title 40, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
 - A. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 904 of Title 40 of the Oklahoma Statutes, the Oklahoma Workforce Commission shall implement programs in this state to address the following:
 - 1. High demand and critical occupation workforce development, which may:
 - identify the needs of institutions of higher education suited for certain critical workforce areas,
 - identify outcomes based on funding, b.

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1	c. scholarship match, and
2	d. improve program capacity development;
3	2. Work-based learning opportunities, which may include, but
4	not be limited to, internships, apprenticeships, and other career
5	exploration and exposure; and
6	3. K-12 district innovation for workforce success, which may:
7	a. enhance pathway development,
8	b. utilize development grants for basic skills
9	development,
10	c. utilize regulatory innovation grants, and
11	d. develop career-connected high schools.
12	B. The Commission may administer these programs through funds
13	in the Workforce Coordination Revolving Fund created in Section
14	255.4 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
15	C. The Commission shall promulgate rules necessary to implement
16	the provisions of this section.
17	SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2025.
