**Research Analysis**

The policy proposed committee substitute for HB 2262 provides that a referral agency must provide a representative of a person with Alzheimer's or any other form of dementia who is considering placement with the disclosure form for each facility the agency recommends. The measure also requires a facility to display in the facility or a designated area that if you were not given a copy of the disclosure form that they may file a complaint with the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Unit.

**Fiscal Analysis**

HB 2262 specifies potential consequences for facilities advertising dementia care that do not provide the required disclosure form to all parties specified in the Alzheimer's Dementia and Other Forms of Dementia Special Care Disclosure Act. Additionally, the State Department of Health (OSDH) may issue a citation if two (2) or more discrepancies are found between the services described in the disclosure and those provided during an inspection.

Officials from OSDH confirmed the requirements of this measure are objective within existing budgetary resources, therefore having no direct fiscal impact on the state budget.
