**Bill Summary and  
Fiscal Analysis:**

SB 753 requires lessees that are entering into a new lease or renewing their contract with the state to remove no less than 85% of invasive woody species as defined in the proposal on the leased property within 2 years and submit a management plan to the Oklahoma Conservation Commission and directs the Commission to conduct annual inspections of leased lands.

The Conservation Commission states they are not a regulatory agency and does not have staff with enforcement experience or expertise and expects they would have to hire approximately 15 to 20 personnel to manage and implement enforcement of the proposal as conservation district staff funded by the state. If legal action is needed, the Commission would need to hire an additional attorney. The Commission estimates approximately \$400,000 for personnel and up to \$900,000 for vehicles and equipment.
