### **Research Analysis**

HB 1101, as introduced, creates a voter referendum to allow wagering on the outcomes of sports contests. The referendum would also increase the amount of money that goes to the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services for the treatment of compulsive gambling, from \$20,833 monthly to \$25,000 monthly. Lastly, the referendum creates the gaming compact supplements that tribes should use if they want to accept the state's offer for sports betting.

The referendum would be invalid if HB 1047 passes.

### **Fiscal Analysis**

HB 1101 sends to a vote of the people the following:

Sections 1 and 3 of the measure offers a supplement to the Model Tribal Gaming Compact, allowing for the offering of Sports Betting in exchange for a 10% exclusivity payment to the State. Annual estimates for the adjusted gross revenue associated with Sports Betting in Oklahoma are approximately \$140,000,000/ yr if Sports Betting is limited to "on-location betting", but is estimated to total \$420,000,000 if Sports Betting is implemented to allow for "mobile betting". At those levels, the State's exclusivity fee annually could range from \$14,000,000 – 42,000,000.

Section 2: reallocates \$50,000 in funding previously directed to the Education Reform Revolving Fund and State General Revenue Fund, (ERRF: -\$44,000; GR: -\$6000), to the Department of Mental health and Substance Abuse Services (ODMHSAS).
